

FUNDS ARE NEEDED FOR THE HOSPITAL

Public Appeal Made for Money to Erect Building, Etc.

A MOST DESERVING CAUSE

Realizing the Growing Need for a Hospital, Enterprising and Humane Citizens Take Steps, and are Meeting With Gratifying Success.

The Gainesville and Alachua County Hospital Association has issued to the public the following circular, which The Sun is requested to publish for general information. The cause is a worthy one, and it is to be hoped that the circular will accomplish the desired result:

This county is very much in need of a public hospital, where the poor people of the county can be treated free of cost, if necessary, and where the well-to-do can have, at moderate cost, trained nursing and every facility to aid in their recovery from serious illness or accident. In certain classes of surgical operations the people especially need the advantages of a well ordered hospital.

We have formed a charitable organization for the purpose of building and maintaining such an institution, and we ask all the people of the county to assist us in this charitable work. If all will help the burden will not fall heavy on anyone.

The population of our county must now be almost 35,000, and with the large number of people exposed to all manner of accidents and diseases there is not a hospital in the entire county. The time has come when this work must be undertaken, and we hope all our citizens can see the need of such an institution and help us to secure it. Once we get the hospital built and furnished we feel sanguine of being able to maintain it. As this is purely a charitable work undertaken in the interest of suffering humanity we feel that we have a right to count upon some assistance from everyone. The association will be legally chartered and well and economically managed. The following is the full list of officers:

The chairman of the Board of County Commissioners and the president of the City Council are also ex-officio members of the Board of Trustees.

All officers of the Association who handle any funds will be under bond, and the affairs of the hospital will be conducted in a business like manner. We want you with us in this work. We intend to make the hospital modern in every particular and a credit to the county. We have raised about four thousand dollars in Gainesville and have purchased a desirable lot on which to erect the buildings. We will need about six thousand dollars more. We desire to give everyone an opportunity to assist in this noble work. Only contribute what you feel you can afford to. A few dollars from each one will give to the county a modern hospital of which we will all be proud. A list of all contributors will be published from time to time in the papers and a careful record will be made of each contribution.

TO FIGHT REVENUE ACT.

Attempt to Break Down a Law of Alabama.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 6.—One of the most strenuous fights ever made on an Alabama law is to be waged against the revenue act passed by the last session of the legislature, and by authority of which the suits against funding companies for the filing for record of deeds of trust have been brought.

There are two of these cases pending. One is against the Continental Trust company, of Baltimore, wherein the state claims \$112,000 fees for recording a deed of trust in Russell county to cover a mortgage given by the Seaboard Air Line, and the other an attempt of the Manhattan Trust company, of New York, to recover \$5,000 paid the probate judge of Montgomery county for the same kind of service on a deed given by the Louisville and Nashville railroad to cover a new issue of bonds to make improvements.

TO ATTEND THE CONFERENCE.

Manufacturers of Cotton Yarns Gather at Charlotte.

Charlotte, N. C., Jan. 6.—A number of manufacturers of hard cotton yarns arrived here tonight to attend the conference called by the Hard Yarn Spinners' association to take important action in connection with trade problems, and it is asserted by officers of the association that the attendance will likely be the largest on record. Among the mill men present are several from New England.

A meeting of the advisory board of the association is in session arranging matters which are to be taken up by the general conference tomorrow. What these matters are, and what action is likely is kept secret. The meeting will convene at noon.

Arrest of Matrimonial Agent.

New Orleans, Jan. 6.—F. C. Farrington, operator of the Beauacre Matrimonial Agency, has been indicted by the United States grand jury. Two indictments, embracing five counts, were returned against him. It is charged that Farrington used the mails fraudulently to deceive and defraud a great number of people throughout the country by attracting their attention to his matrimonial agency, and promising to engage them to a rich creole widow, who was looking for a capable man to marry her and manage her sugar estate.

Railroads Responsible for Monopoly.

New York, Jan. 6.—In an address at Cooper Union, President Jacob G. Schurmann, of Cornell university, has declared that the high organization of modern society tends to suppress the individual. This, he said, is especially true in the industrial field, where hand-a-part of the machine. The railway monopoly was largely responsible, according to his view, for many of the combinations in industry. Regulation of rates and the restoration of competition are, he said, the best remedies, because government ownership would simply mean control of the railways by politicians.

Japanese Warship at Manila.

Manila, Jan. 6.—Steamers returning here from the south report a Japanese cruiser patrolling San Bernardino straits.

At 2 p. m. today (Jan. 5) the Japanese cruiser Takasagi approached the entrance to Manila harbor and when signalled asking if she intended to enter, the answer was in the negative. She also refused to state where she was from and for whence she was proceeding and put to sea under full steam.

Crew and Captain Saved.

Wilmington, N. C., Jan. 6.—After a night of intense suffering from the cold, clinging for dear life to the masts of their shipwrecked vessel, heavy seas breaking over her decks and carrying everything before the mad rush of its fury, Captain P. C. Gibbs and six men, composing the crew of the schooner Emma C. Middleton, from Newport News to Charleston, S. C. with a cargo of coal, were brought here by the Wilmington tug Alexander Jones, the vessel and her cargo being a total wreck on Frying Pan shoals, 10 miles east of Baldhead light house, on the North Carolina coast.

Carload of Cotton Burned.

Winder, Ga., Jan. 6.—At Hogart, a small station on the Seaboard, a few miles north of this place, a carload of cotton has been destroyed by fire. The cotton was in transit over the Seaboard. When discovered by the train men the fire had so eaten its way into the bales as to make all efforts at saving it futile. It is supposed to have originated by sparks from the match or cigarette of some tramp heating his way over the road.

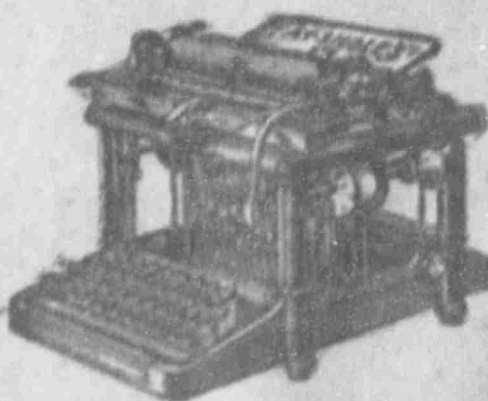
