

WILL MEET THE DEMAND.

Diamond Ice Company Will Erect Fine Plants at Alachua and Starke.

At a meeting of the manager, Mr. Livingston, of the Diamond Ice Co., with the company's stockholders at Alachua, who include the leading merchants and stock raisers in that territory, last week, it was unanimously agreed to install an ice plant at that point at once. This will be a fifteen-ton machine, made by the Columbus Iron Works, and will be the same style and pattern as the one they have here, and will make the same high grade of pure crystal ice. This machine is now ordered and, barring accidents, should be in operation by April—in time for the cantaloupe shipments.

This plant will be known as the Alachua Ice and Packing Co., and will be built and equipped especially for storing and curing all the meats and like commodities slaughtered or grown in that territory.

This plant will sell its ice in the territory from Raiford, east, on the Jacksonville & Southwestern, including Baldwin, Lake Butler, Haynesworth and intermediate points; Suwannee river, west, including Santa Fe, Griffins, Kamoko, Cadillac, Newberry, Younglove and all points beyond, and on the Seaboard from Starke, east, including Sampson City, Clayno, Ward City, La-Crosse, Getzen, into Alachua, and all points west to the Suwannee river, including Hodges, Osceola, Neels, Willeford, Bell and Wannee; on the Atlantic Coast Line from Hague, south to Fort White, north, including Clarke, Wade, Lexington, Victoria and Dutton's, and carload shipments to Crystal River.

As soon as the factory is completed they will put up a similar machine at Starke, twenty miles east of Gainesville. This plant, like the one at Alachua, will be a fifteen-ton machine, and will be thoroughly equipped for curing and storing meats, and in addition will have a "special strawberry cold storage," so arranged as to keep the berries at an even temperature, thus insuring their original, fresh flavor and condition until sold. This factory will be known as the Starke Ice and Produce Co., and will sell its ice in the territory between Macclenny and Baldwin, east, on the Seaboard, including Maxville, Highland, Lawtey, Temple, and northwest to Burnetts Lake, including Thomasville, Atlantic, Wainrights and Pine Island, and south including Hawthorn, Rex, Campville, Orange Heights, Melrose.

This plant, being the only one located on the Seaboard, will have entire charge of the carload shipments going to Cedar Key for the various shipping firms there, loading ice direct from its tanks into the Seaboard Air Line cars, thus insuring to the buyers the best possible condition of the ice and the company the minimum cost of handling.

Manager Livingston states that the present capacity of the Gainesville plant will not be increased, as the output is equal to the demand. The capacity of the Gainesville plant is twenty tons per twenty-four hours, which is abundant to supply the demand.
