

PHOSPHATE INDUSTRY TO BE EXTENDED

Immense Deposits Lie in the Extreme West Alachua County.

WILL SOON BE OPENED

Extension of the J. & S.-W. Means a Great Deal Towards Increasing Output—Prospectors Declare That Immense Beds Have Been Discovered. "The phosphate industry, which is already one of the greatest in this county, is going to be considerably extended—perhaps doubled—by the opening of the new country by the extension of the Southwestern Railroad," remarked a gentleman who is thoroughly posted on phosphate, and in a position to know what he is talking about, Friday.

This gentleman stated that the country traversed by this extension had been prospected, and was rich in phosphate, large deposits having been discovered throughout the section as far west as the Suwannee River. The only reason that the property has not been mined has been on account of the inadequate facilities for moving the product. There is no doubt now but that the land, which is owned principally by large corporations, will be opened and worked, which will mean possibly the doubling of the output within the next two years.

Aside from the phosphate industry which it is anticipated this extension will open up, there are hundreds of thousands of acres of the finest pine timber in the South, which means that naval stores plants and saw mills will be established. There are also innumerable acres of the finest hard wood, which will afford another industry, since hard wood is now in great demand. In all, the prospects for the West End were never brighter, and the good people of that section have a right for rejoicing.

The work of grading on the extension, which will run from Newberry to Deadman's Bay, a distance of about eighty miles, is progressing rapidly, several "gangs" being employed in the work. It is estimated that the road will be completed to the Gulf terminals within twelve months.

NEW EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

Material Now Being Delivered—McCarroll Stone Will be Employed.

Material for the proposed new Episcopal church is being daily delivered upon the grounds. Three carloads of fine Georgia brick have already been received, and more are expected daily. In all, thirty-three thousand brick will be employed in the basework of the building.

It was stated some time ago that the building committee, who originally decided upon the McCarroll stone, had agreed not to use this material, but to make the building of pressed brick. It seems that this was an error, as the committee has never thought of using anything else, and McCarroll stone will be employed in its construction.

This stone, which is a composition and said to very durable, is an exact imitation of granite, and will make a handsome building.

Work upon the building will begin as soon as the necessary material arrives upon the ground, and will be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible.

BROWN HOUSE EXTENSION.

Eight Rooms Have Been Added to This Hostelry and Neatly Furnished.

TO COST A MILLION DOLLARS.

Electric Railway Between Asheville and Mining Districts.

Asheville, N. C., Jan. 20.—Within the next 30 days contracts will be let for the first electric freight railway in the south, which is to be built out of Asheville into the mining districts of Madison and Yancey counties, North Carolina, by the George D. Miles company, the president of which company is now in Asheville completing details for the letting of the contracts. Major Miles, when speaking of the proposed road, said:

"Our road will cost a million dollars. We are going to equip it with a \$60,000 electric locomotive and hope to have the work of construction started within the next 30 days."

Florists in Cannes say it will be at least \$500,000.
