

GRAND OPENING OF BIBLE CONFERENCE

Large Crowd Assembled at This Notable Function.

REV. STEWART PREACHED

The Eminent Tennessee Evangelist Delivered Stirring Sermons Both Afternoon and Evening, Which Were Enjoyed—Monday's Program.

On Sunday, February 5, at 3 p. m., the doors of the Tabernacle were thrown open for the first meeting, second annual convention, of the Winter Bible Conference, and although the day had been cloudy, the elements seemed to favor the plan, and the sun shed its rays for a short time to cheer the workers.

At 8:15 Dr. Strouse arrived with the speakers, some of whom had been delayed in reaching the city, but the activity of Dr. Strouse soon got the meeting in working order, and after singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," Rev. Dr. Sullien of Cleveland, Tenn., invoked Divine blessings on the meetings. "Nearer My God to Thee" was sung by the large choir, whereupon the order of meetings was announced and Dr. George Stewart, the noted evangelist, was announced to deliver the sermon.

Miss N. H. Munford of Philadelphia then sang the beautiful solo, "Oh, Calvary," in a most impressive manner. She has a powerful alto voice, full of sweetness.

Rev. S. E. Rogers of the Baptist church followed with a most earnest prayer for the success of the Conference.

Rev. Dr. Stewart, in opening his remarks, apologized for the delay in his arrival. He took his text from Galatians, 6:10: "As We Have Therefore Opportunity, Let Us Do Unto All Men, Especially Unto Those Who Are Unto the Household of Faith." A fluent speaker, a man of brilliant thought and believer and preacher of the true gospel, he carried his audience with him throughout his discourse, sometimes in tears, sometimes in merry laughter, but always with him.

The many incidents he related were pointed and plain to the seeker after religious knowledge, and he showed that the Christian brotherhood and sisterhood should be the greatest of the whole world. In comparing the fraternal orders with the brotherhood of Christ he said that the only good thing about Masonry or any other of the orders was taken from the Bible, and the reason of the great growth of these orders was that they had taken up the Bible where the churches had laid it down. The real power of the gospel, he said, was its practice.

After a solo by Miss Munford, and a song by the choir, the benediction was pronounced by Rev. F. H. Craighill, rector of Holy Trinity Church.

Sunday evening the big tabernacle was crowded, the service being a union one. Dr. Stewart again delivered an interesting sermon, which was deeply impressive and highly enjoyed.

The session of the Conference begins under most favorable conditions, and a most successful meeting is anticipated.

Monday's Session.

Monday's session of the Conference was one eminently successful, both from its effectiveness and point of attendance. Rev. Stewart delivered a sermon in the morning. In the afternoon Dr. W. E. Blackstone, who became so popular in his Bible teachings last year, addressed the Conference for the first time this season. Dr. Blackstone is one of the finest and best posted Bible students in the United States, and his work, part of which is illustrated, always proves of deep interest.

In the evening Rev. Stewart, who does not propose to remain here long, interested the large audience with another fine sermon, and all who heard him felt refreshed in the spirit.

The daily program during the Conference will be services at 9:30 a. m., 3 p. m. and 7:30 p. m. All are cordially invited.


