Adjutant-General Foster of the Florida State Troops and Colonel Norvell of the United States Army, will arrive in the city Tuesday for the purpose of inspecting the Gainesville Guards.

Captain C. R. Layton, commanding the company, is very desirous of making a fine appearance, and has issued the following order:

"Pursuant to General Orders No. 1, Company M, 2nd Infantry, will be inspected by the Adjutant-General and Colonel S. T. Norvell, U. S. A., retired, on Tuesday, March 7, 1905.

"Blue uniforms, caps, leggings, white standing collars, white gloves and black shoes, will be worn.

"The Company will assemble at 7:30 p. m.

"No excuse for absence from this ceremony will be accepted after same is over, but it must be presented and acted upon before assembly.

"Enlisted men must see that they are fully equipped, and all articles required must be obtained from the Company Commander before March 7.
