

A FEAST OF GOOD THINGS ENJOYED

By All Who Attended the Chautauqua Exercises.

SERMON, LECTURE, MUSIC

Entertainment for the Masses—Brilliant Address by Dr. Blackstone—Scholarly Lecture by Rev. C. L. Herald—Musical Recitations and Poems.

The Tabernacle was closed until 5 p. m. on Sunday, when Rev. Dr. Strouse conducted the vesper service, and there was a very fine audience in attendance.

In the evening at 8 o'clock the grand old man, Dr. Blackstone, delivered a profound address on "England's National Sin," taking the evils of the opium habit in India, practiced with the full knowledge of the British government and not the slightest effort made to prevent the destruction of her subjects through this pernicious habit. The thorough knowledge of this eminent divine with his subject commanded the attention of his hearers to every word of his instructive account of this revolting practice, which is debauching these benighted people.

The lecture at the Tabernacle Monday at 2:30 p. m. was one of the best so far delivered at the Chautauqua. The topic in the printed program was changed to "Thought and Culture," and the lecturer, Rev. Chas. L. Herald of Jackson, Ohio, showed by his arguments his mastering of the subject. In speaking of culture, the reverend gentleman was of the opinion that it was not wholly confined to Boston, and that he had met culture in Baltimore, New York and Philadelphia.

His illustration of wealth without culture was forceful, and his explanation of the injury of beauty brought on by evil thoughts was very strongly portrayed in his story of Leonardo's wonderful painting of the Christ with the Madonna when he selected the face of a beautiful boy in a church choir. In later years he desired a face to represent Judas, who betrayed Christ, and went to a prison, where he found his subject. Afterward it was discovered that the two faces were the same. Evil thoughts in the intervening years had wrought the change.

He closed with a beautiful illustration of the ideals, and said that the one ideal he had chosen was the Christ. "I want to be good," he said, "and I look to Christ, the Nazarine, for all my goodness. He is my ideal."

Evening Program.

The evening program had an array of talent that was highly entertaining, Miss Marietta La Dell in dramatic readings and W. A. (Bill) Bone in poetical readings. Both of these artists acquitted themselves with credit.

The musical specialties of McClean & Shelton, the originators of the famous musical novelty, the "Acquarian Chimes," making music—sweet music emanate from bottles. They also rendered harp, mandolin and guitar solos, and a piece solo by Mr. McClean and cornet solo by A. V. Shelton were both very fine.

Today's Program.

Owing to the indisposition of Dr. Blackstone, the Bible lecture at 10:30 a. m. will be omitted as it was yesterday morning.

At 2:30 p. m. will be heard Mr. W. A. Bone in poems, humorous and pathetic, some of them his own productions, and readings by Mrs. La Dell.

At 7:30 p. m. the Novelty Musical Company will give another of their fine programs, and 8 p. m., lecture, "Life on a Man-of-War," by Rev. Chas. Laing Herald. This will be one of the best of the Chautauqua.

CZAR TO CONVENE ASSEMBLY.

Official Newspaper of Russia Regards This "Russia's Happiest Hour."

St. Petersburg, March 6.—The imperial rescript announcing that Emperor Nicholas has decided to convene an assembly of elected representatives of the people to elaborate and consider legislation, has produced a wonderful impression.

The war and the battle below Mukden are forgotten.

The rescript is hailed by many as a second emancipation proclamation on the anniversary of the first; the Novos Vremya characterizing it as Russia's happiest hour. The Liberals are amazed, and in the flush of enthusiasm are reading it as a recognition of the elective principle, and the complete surrender of autocracy, but discriminating people, while regarding it as a great victory, realize that all will depend on the manner in which the reform is carried out.

Attempt to Kill Millionaire.

Warsaw, March 4—4:58 p. m.—A telegram from Lodz says a bomb was exploded today in the mansion of M. Posenanski, a millionaire cotton manufacturer, and one servant was killed. M. Posenanski's employes went out on strike yesterday.

The bomb exploded in the hand of the house porter, who is supposed to have been examining it. The porter was blown to pieces. Two other of the deadly bombs and incriminating correspondence were found in the porter's apartments.

The police believe the bombs were intended to kill M. Posenanski. It is reported that the police have arrested and incarcerated in the citadel all the strike leaders, a total of 39 men.
