

**Strike in Southern Russia.**  
St. Petersburg, March 10.—A telegram from Ekatorinoslav, South Russia, says that five miners have been killed and 15 wounded in a conflict between strikers of the Shoerbinov mines and the Auerbach quicksilver mines and soldiers in the district of Bakhmut. The strikers started looting and the troops threatened to shoot. The former thereupon fired at the soldiers with revolvers and also threw stones at them, whereupon the troops fired a volley, and order was restored. Revolutionary disorders have broken out at Smolensk, Middle Russia. Bands of demonstrators are marching through the streets carrying red flags.

**Rear-End Collision Near Macon.**  
Macon, Ga., March 10.—As the result of a rear-end collision, which occurred Wednesday night between a Central railroad passenger train and a wrecking train at Smarrs, Ga., Foreman B. F. Bray, of the wrecker, is probably fatally injured; Engineer Louis Rebb, of the passenger train, and his negro fireman, are badly injured, and Mail Clerk T. M. Hamilton and Baggage-master W. C. Roberts are also painfully hurt. The wrecker was running as special, and after stopping the flagman failed to get out on the tracks far enough to prevent the passenger train from colliding with the wrecker.

**Mule's Kick Proves Fatal.**  
Estonton, Ga., March 10.—Norwood, the 5-year-old son of David L. Lawrence, of this county, who was kicked in the forehead by a mule several days ago, fracturing the skull, has since died. He was brought to town for treatment. Drs. Weaver and Talliferro performed the operation. The wound was found to be more serious than was at first thought. A fragment of the skull was from the ordeal removed, but he never fully recovered from the ordeal.

**Prominent Alabamian Suicides.**  
Montgomery, Ala., March 10.—The community was severely shocked at the unexpected death of Samuel Gassenhelmer, who was found dead in his room on Alabama street, his body cold and stiff, and his flesh a purplish hue from an overdose of morphine which he had taken. Three bottles of chloroform, a bottle of morphine tablets three-fourths used up, were found on the bureau in his room.

**New Cruiser in Commission.**  
Norfolk, Va., March 10.—The United States cruiser Galveston recently completed and placed in commission at the Norfolk navy yard, will sail next Wednesday for Galveston, Tex., where she goes to receive a silver service to be presented by the citizens of Galveston. Upon her return the cruiser will have her "free route" trial trip over the measured course off Newport, R. I.

**Engineer Badly Mangled.**  
Augusta, Ga., March 10.—Walter E. Sirvia, an engineer on the Southern railway, had one leg cut off at the knee and the other foot just above the ankle as the result of an accident in Hamburg, S. C., just across the river from Augusta. Mr. Sirvia was brought to this city and immediately carried to the city hospital. There are chances for his recovery.
