Atlanta, March 13.—Active and energetic work on the part of Governor Joseph M. An address was delivered by Mrs. Frederick Schöff, of Philadelphia, president of the congress, and reports were made by the secretary-treasurer and several state representatives. In her address Mrs. Schöff spoke of the part taken by the organization in pressing the inquiry into Senator Smoot's right to his seat.

The terrible blow caused the ultimate death of the boy and Jackson was arrested.



Under and pursuant to the requirements of the statutes of the State of Florida, we, the undersigned, T. B. Stringfellow, R. L. Stringfellow and R. B. Livingston, desiring for ourselves, our associates and successors, to form and be incorporated as a corporation, do hereby give notice that we shall apply to the Governor of the State of Florida for Letters Patent.

**THE PROPOSED CHARTER IS AS FOLLOWS:**

First—The corporate name of said corporation shall be ALACHUA ICE AND SALT COMPANY, located and having its principal office and place of business at Alachua, Florida.

Second—The general nature of the business to be transacted and the purposes and objects for which this corporation is organized, are: The buying, selling and manufacturing of ice; the construction, equipment and operation of a water plant in connection therewith and the furnishing of water for any and all purposes; the construction and operation of an electric, gas or other lighting plant; the purchase and sale of goods, wares and merchandise and of real and personal property of whatsoever character, and generally to do all things necessary and proper for carrying on said business or to protect and advance the interests thereof, and for these purposes to have and possess all the rights, benefits, privileges and immunities incident to, and given under the laws of this State to a corporation of such character.

Third—The amount of the capital

stock of said corporation shall be Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000) dollars, to be divided into two hundred fifty (250) shares, at a par value of One Hundred (\$100) dollars each, payable in lawful money of the United States, except where the subscriber desires to pay for same in property, labor or service, and in such event the same shall be at a just valuation to be fixed by the board of directors at a meeting called for such purpose, and provided that said board then agrees to accept such payment.

Fourth.—This corporation shall exist for a period of ninety-nine years and its corporate existence shall commence on the date of the issuance of letters patent.

Fifth.—The business of this corporation is to be conducted by a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, and a board of not less than three nor more than seven directors, of which board of directors the president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer shall be members and stockholders, and all officers of said corporation shall be chosen by the stockholders. L. Stringfellow, president; R. B. Livingston, vice-president; T. B. Stringfellow, secretary and treasurer. The board of directors shall be R. L. Stringfellow, R. B. Livingston, T. B. Stringfellow, James Cheanut and C. A. Williams, until their successors shall be elected.
