Mr. Huff states that he has finished shipping lettuce, of which he had a fair crop. He, with other growers, sold cabbage at \$1.50 per crate, average, f. o. b. Evinston, with the result that they made a fairly good thing from the cabbage crop. He expects to begin the shipment of beans about April 15th, and anticipates good returns, as his product will be choice. Mr. Huff is thinking seriously of installing an irrigating plant, which will protect him from the disadvantage of the long dry periods, and will permit him to grow prolific crops, despite the absence of rain.

RURAL FREE DELIVERY.

Government Wants Applicants—Blanks May be Had From Postmaster.

The postoffice department, as has been formerly stated, expect to establish a free rural mail delivery in Alachua county, and applications for bids have been posted in the office in Gainesville. The date has not yet been decided upon, but will be fixed later by the government.

There will eventually be five routes established, leading from Gainesville to various points in the county. These routes will furnish lucrative employment to as many carriers, the position paying \$750 per year for six days' work, averaging eight hours a day. The appointments will not be confined to politics, being under civil service rules, and all are eligible.

The requirements for an applicant are that he must be of sound body and mind, over the age of eighteen, and if appointed must furnish his own team and provide feed for same.

The examination is not difficult, and desirable young men are wanted for the work. Applications and all other information may be secured from Postmaster Arnow.

THE GAINESVILLE DIRECTORY.

Work Was Begun Tuesday—Six Weeks Will be Required to Complete.

With a determination to finish the work as soon as possible, Jesse E. Burtz, who has undertaken the compiling of a city directory of Gainesville, began his duties Tuesday, and proposes to push the matter as rapidly as possible.

The compiling of a directory is a great and peculiar undertaking, and the public do not really realize the work attached to it. It is a most peculiar avocation—something which is not generally understood, but an accurate work is assured, and it is needless to add that it will prove of great and lasting benefit to Gainesville.

This will be the first and only directory ever issued for Gainesville under metropolitan style. It will be a handsome cloth-bound book, durable in every way, and a credit to the city.

The compiler feels confident that he will find a great increase in population over the directory census taken here five years ago. He calculates that Gainesville, which was then less than 4,000, will reach a population in this directory of 6,000, possibly more.

STONE IS NOT READY.

Corner-Stone of Holy Trinity Church Will Not be Laid Today.

The corner-stone of the elegant new building of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, which was scheduled to have been laid today with impressive ceremonies, is not ready, hence this function will be postponed until a later date, which will be announced in due time.

The girl's mother was violently opposed to the match and the girl turned to her father for aid. Her parents separated some time ago, the girl remaining with the mother. The father was as favorable to the match as the mother was opposed, and he advised the girl to elope. She readily agreed, and the father went along to act as chaperon. With his aid there was no difficulty in securing a license, the Rev. Dr. James R. Graham married the two.

Texas Wins in Supreme Court.

Washington, March 21.—In an opinion by Justice Holmes the supreme court of the United States today decided in favor of the state of Texas the controversy between Greer county, Oklahoma and the state of Texas, over land granted by that state to the county for school purposes when the county was a part of Texas. The decision was based on the ground that Greer county, Oklahoma, is not the same person that Greer county, Texas, was and that it, therefore, has no claim upon the Texas school fund.

White Man Kills Negro.

Savannah, Ga., March 21.—Alfred Lewis, a negro, was shot and killed last night on East Broad street by Willie Snyder, a young white man of Liberty county. Snyder made his escape. The trouble grew out of Snyder having slapped a young negro, the man taking the matter up.

Killed by Trolley Car.

Birmingham, Ala., March 21.—F. Kiehle, a prominent merchant of Ensley, was run over and killed on the Village Creek trestle Sunday night between Ensley and Pratt City, by a trolley car. Mr. Kiehler's brother-in-law, Adam Glass, saved his life by jumping.
