Bills Coming in at a Very Lively
Rate Now.

ALACHUA CO. IN THE HOUSE

The Insanity Bill to be Repealed—A Measure to Regulate the East Coast Railroad Rates—The Brown-Baskin Case Not Yet Settled.

Tallahassee, Fla., April 7.—In the Senate Thursday a bill was introduced by Senator Crill for a geological survey.

Senator Scott: A bill to repeal the present law making incurable insanity ground for divorce.

Senator Crill: A bill to encourage the Florida East Coast Railway to construct its line on southward to Key West. The purpose of the bill is to fix the rates of the road so they cannot be interfered with except by act of the Legislature. This bill will be watched with interest, because if it became a law it would take the power out of the Railroad Commission's hands to reduce rates on the Florida East Coast Railway.

Bills were introduced as follows: To give the Tampa fair \$15,000 annually; to equalize taxes; to punish State, county and municipal officers, except sheriffs, who shall accept free passes; to extend time for completion of Florida Coast Line Canal; city charter for Lake Butler.

Friday's Proceedings.

Tallahassee, April 7.—The Senate was not in session today. The House held a short and uneventful session and adjourned at noon until Monday at 4 p. m.

Senator McCreary yesterday introduced the bill amending existing laws on divorce, in that the time in which a decree pro confesso in non resident cases can be granted only after expiration of a period of twelve months from the time of the published notice. The present time limit is sixty days.

The usual bill for the repeal of the insanity divorce law has been introduced.

Alachua in the House.

Alachua county did not fare especially well yesterday, so far as chairmanships were concerned, in the appointments announced by Speaker Gilchrist. Neither of her representatives was made the chairman of any committee. Mr. Tillman is on the Committees on Appropriations, City and County Organizations, Education and Journal; Mr. Rosborough on Committees on Corporations, Public Lands, Mining and Phosphate and Miscellaneous Legislation. All these committees are important ones.

The resolution adopted in the House this morning appointing a special committee to whom all measures, including appropriations, affecting State institutions, shall be referred, will result in the Committee on Education and Appropriation being shorn of much of their duties. This bill, introduced by Mr. Wall of Putnam, provides that no member from any county in which is located any of the State institutions, shall be a member of this special committee.

The Senate.

The Senate held a very short session yesterday morning and adjourned until 4 p. m. Monday.

Shortly after adjournment the Committee on Privileges and Elections held a meeting and heard statements from Hon. C. M. Brown and Hon. J. G. Baskin, both claiming to be the lawful representative in the Senate for the 20th district, composed of Marion and Sumter counties.
