Many Bills Are Coming Into Both Senate and House.

The joint resolution providing for an amendment to section 9 of article 5 of the State Constitution, introduced in the House yesterday afternoon, provides that the salary of each Justice of the Supreme Court shall be \$4,500 a year, and that the salary of each Circuit Judge shall be \$4,000 a year.

The salaries paid at present are \$3,000

and \$2,500, respectively.

The bill introduced in the House by Mr. Rosborough of Alachua, defining the rights and liabilities of master and servant, has already attracted considerable attention. It is said to have been submitted to a prominent Jacksonville attorney and to have the especial indorsement of the railway employees of the State.


