Senator McCreary's Educational Bill Is Heartily Endorsed.

### PROTEST AGAINST CHARTER

Rev. J. W. Carpenter Favors the Uniform Text-Book Measure—North Gainesville Files an Objection—Other News from the State Capital.

Tallahassee, April 10.—The new Gainesville charter bill has been received here and is now being carefully considered by Alachua's Senator and Representatives. A protest has also been received from a committee of citizens of North Gainesville as follows:

"Notice is hereby given that a notice is being published as prescribed by law for the formation of a municipality, comprising the east one-half (½) of section thirty-one (31), the entire of section thirty-two (32), and the west half (½) of section thirty-three (33), in township nine (9) south, range twenty (20) east, in the county of Alachua, in the State of Florida, to be known as North Gainesville, the aforesaid territory being embraced within the bill providing for a new charter for the city of Gainesville.

"I am glad you have introduced a bill for uniformity of school books. There are not less than 1,000 families who change their place of residence in the State every year. I have paid out \$5 for books since coming to Tampa.

### SPRING PARK FARM.

Manager Callison Extends Courtesies to Gainesville Friends.

The reporter of The Sun, with his family, had the pleasure a few days recently of being entertained by N. A. Callison, manager of Spring Park Farm, in that hospitable, clever manner for which Mr. Callison has been noted for several years. As one visitor expressed himself, the genial host almost "made him tired" in an endeavor to provide for his comfort—but of course the complaint came in a good-natured way.

Mr. Callison never tires of doing something for the comfort of those friends who go to see him, and it is seldom he is without company.

Through the courtesy of Mr. Callison we were shown through a section of the farm, which comprises a large tract. The Hereford and Jersey registered cattle, and the Berkshire registered hogs, the registered Angora goats, are all doing nicely. Of the Hereford stock there is one male cow weighing 2,200, and another about 1,600, both of which were prize winners at the World's Fair, St. Louis, and which were purchased recently by the breeders in Texas.

Mr. Callison has forty-six head of registered Hereford and Jersey cows, six head of registered Berkshire hogs, and a number of Angora goats on the farm of the Spring Park Stock Farm Company. The largest of the hogs tips the beam at 640 pounds, although all are large. It is safe to say that this is the best stocked farm of genuine registered cattle in the State.

## THE LEGISLATURE RESUMES BUSINESS

Many Bills Are Coming Into Both Senate and House.

### A TRIP TO PESACOLA PLANNED

New State Buildings Asked for to Accommodate Public Officers—Rosborough's Bill Defining Rights of Servants and Masters.

Tallahassee, April 11.—A resolution by Mr. Blount in the Senate yesterday, appointing a committee of five in both the Senate and House, to consider the practicability of the Governor, executive officers and Legislature, through an invitation of the Chamber of Commerce, visiting Pensacola during the time the U. S. warships are in port, was adopted.

Several new bills were introduced as follows:

By Mr. Trammell—Pertaining to insurance where there is a total loss; elementary civil government and agriculture in public schools; construction of academic building for South Florida Military College.

By Mr. Harris—Bill making appropriation of \$45,000 for the erection of additional buildings for the use of the public officers to be assigned by the Governor.

By Mr. McCreary—To amend the law relating to the imposing of license and other taxes.

By Mr. Wilson—A bill to limit the amount of bonds that may be issued by any city or town; also to validate contracts of persons over twenty-one years of age under certain conditions.

By Mr. Raney—To make an appropriation for the Florida State College at Tallahassee.

By Mr. Brown—A bill for the relief of Marion county; also to regulate the width of tires on vehicles operating upon brick or hard surface roads; also to authorize Marion county to issue warrants to remodel court house.

By Mr. Canova—To amend the law relating to public schools.

The House.

The joint resolution providing for an amendment to section 9 of article 5 of the State Constitution, introduced in the House yesterday afternoon, provides that the salary of each Justice of the Supreme Court shall be \$4,500 a year, and that the salary of each Circuit Judge shall be \$4,000 a year.

The salaries paid at present are \$3,000 and \$2,500, respectively.

Representative Rosborough of Alachua—A bill to authorize the service of processes from County Judges' courts to be executed by constables.

Representative Williams of Polk—A bill to pay owners of live stock by order of the State veterinary agent.

The bill introduced in the House by Mr. Rosborough of Alachua, defining the rights and liabilities of master and servant, has already attracted considerable attention. It is said to have been submitted to a prominent Jacksonville attorney and to have the especial endorsement of the railway employees of the State.
