

PROCEEDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE

Mr. Noble's Governor's Mansion Bill Did Not Go.

MANY OTHER BILLS READ

Some Were Introduced, Others Were Placed on Second Reading and Engrossed, While Still Others Were Killed—Prominent Visitors.

Tallahassee, April 18.—The House members tackled the subject of a Governor's mansion Monday morning, and while the members objected to the particular bill under discussion, it was evident that a majority of the House favors an appropriation for the building of a Governor's mansion under certain conditions. The bill under discussion was the one introduced by Mr. Noble of Lake. The committee to whom it was referred reported it adversely, and the chairman of the committee explained that such action was against that particular bill, and was not the sense of the committee on the proposition. The bill was laid on the table by a vote of 44 to 14, but many explained that they favored the proposition to build a Governor's mansion, but did not approve the method suggested in Mr. Noble's bill.

In the House Monday morning, General Jewell of Orange offered a petition from the Florida division, United Confederate Veterans, to remove the limit of sixty-five years from the pension laws of Florida.

The select committee on State institutions and the public health committee were allowed a clerk.

Mr. Noble of Lake offered a concurrent resolution relative to appropriations for institutions of learning—for a joint committee of seven, to examine into benefits now derived by the people at large from these institutions, whether any of the schools can be dispensed with, and which ones—designating under what name and character and for what purposes such institutions shall be retained.

Mr. Pirrong of Calhoun offered a resolution for a special committee of nine, five from the House and four from the Senate, to select and designate such colleges of this State to be the recipients of State aid, and to create a fund to be set apart for the support and maintenance of said colleges.

Mr. Johnston of Pasco offered a resolution tendering the Hall of Representatives to the Good Roads Convention on the evening of April 25. This was adopted.

Introduction of Bills.

The following new bills were introduced:

By Mr. Wells of Hillsboro—A memorial to Congress to amend pension laws of United States increasing Mexican War pensions from \$8 to \$12. Also a bill for relief of David L. Crum. Also a bill to validate a bonding ordinance of the city of Tampa, an election thereunder and the bonds issued in compliance therewith.

By Mr. Paul of Holmes—Relative to working and maintaining public roads and bridges in this State.

By Mr. Wartmann of Marion—To authorize Ocala to combine certain offices of the city and for other purposes. Also, a bill authorizing Ocala to assess and collect certain taxes.

By Mr. Johnston of Pasco—To amend the law relating to obtaining money under false pretenses, and violation of contracts. Also, a bill relative to the right to and life of executions. Also, a bill to amend Chapter 5260, relative to the employment by county commissioners of labor of persons committed by county courts and held in jail for misdemeanor, but not convicted.

By Mr. Dorman of Suwannee—Relative to delivery of messages by telegraph companies and others in towns of 500 or more inhabitants.

By Mr. Smith of Volusia—Relative to the municipality of New Smyrna.

By Mr. Kirkland of Lake—To provide punishment for pools, trusts and conspiracies to control prices.

By Mr. Bryan of Washington—To provide revenue for the State from collateral paper, mortgages, notes, contracts, liens, loans and all other papers given for a consideration and entitled to be recorded in any county in this State. The fee fixed is 30 cents on each \$100.

prevailed, and the bill was made a special order for next Monday at noon.

The bill by Mr. Wartmann of Marion, relating to binding witnesses over by justices of the peace and county judges, when sitting as committing magistrates, to appear before the grand jury, was passed 48 to 0.

Bills on Second Reading.

The bill to enlarge the powers of the city of Daytona, introduced by Mr. Smith of Volusia, was read the second time and ordered engrossed.

Mr. Crawford's bill relating to the posting of lands, and Dr. Julian's bill to legalize and validate all warrants heretofore issued by boards of county commissioners for work and materials in constructing court houses and jails for county purposes, were read the second time and ordered engrossed.

Committees Announced.

Speaker Gilchrist announced the following committees:

Members on the part of the House to visit the convict camps—Messrs. Robinson of Leon, Tillman of Alachua and McElroy of Levy.

Members on the part of the House to visit the Florida Hospital for the Insane—Messrs. Knight of Citrus, Fillingim of Escambia and Sledge of Jefferson.

Committee to draft resolutions in respect to the memory of the late chief clerk of the House, Dr. William Forsyth B. Bynum—Messrs. Crawford of Orange, Hall of Suwannee and Persons of Columbia.

In the Senate.

The Senate met at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon and necessarily held but a short session. New bills introduced included the following:

By Mr. Hudson—To create St. Lucie county and to provide for its organization and government. This is a proposition to divide Brevard county. Mr. Hudson also introduced a bill to punish the sale, gift and exchange of intoxicating liquors with the Seminole Indians.

By Mr. Massey—To amend the revised statutes relating to petty larceny.

By Mr. Blount—To amend the law providing the government of the city of Pensacola.

By Mr. Harris—To provide for the appointment of State game commissioners and county game wardens, and to repeal the act of 1897.

By Mr. Brown—Authorizing the city of Ocala to make assessment and provide for collection of taxes; also, authorizing the city of Ocala to combine certain offices.

By Mr. Gillen—Authorizing city or town clerks to appoint deputies; also, requiring councils and boards of aldermen to hold open sessions.

The House bill amending the law relating to the powers of the City Council of Live Oak was passed.

Mr. Jewell's concurrent resolution regarding the return of the Florida battleflags was adopted.

Mr. Stockton's bill creating a board of control for the educational institutions of the State when reached on its second reading was made a special order for next Monday at 4:30 p. m., in order that it might be fully considered.

Dr. Crill's pure food bill was ordered printed, so that its provisions may be more fully understood before further consideration.

Judge Raney announced that the next hearing in the Baskin-Brown con-

test would be held at the usual place on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock, and he stated that all were invited to attend. The Senate then adjourned.

On motion of Senator McCreary, the bill to create a general State board of trustees for all State educational institutions was made the special order in the Senate for Monday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. The debate on this matter was most interesting. It was desired to call up the bill Wednesday, but after a short debate the Senator from Alachua carried his point. Several hundred copies were ordered printed.

Among the distinguished visitors to the Capital City are Mayor W. R. Thomas, Prof. J. M. Pound, Dr. J. F. McKinstry, Jr., Dr. J. L. Kelley and Sheriff L. W. Fennell of Gainesville, and Dr. J. D. Watkins of Micanopy.

Anti-Tuberculosis League Meets.

Atlanta, April 18.—Delegates to the American Anti-Tuberculosis League began reaching Atlanta Sunday, and while there were not many arrivals during the day the ranks of the organization multiplied rapidly with the arrival of the night trains. The league will be called to order by Dr. George Brown, of Atlanta, Monday morning in the hall of house of representatives and it is almost an assured fact that several hundred of the leading physicians from all sections of the country will be in attendance when the league is ready for business. Over a thousand delegates representing leading national and state medical societies have been enrolled.
