Lakeland has a population of 2,574,
a gain of 1,374 in five years.

Jupiter will have a wireless tele-
graph station costing \$5,000.

The recent heavy rains in Lee
county have benefited crops and filled
cisterns.

An electric railway from Eustis to
Tavares is being agitated, and it may
be built in a short time.

The Sanford celery growers are said
to have cleared upwards of \$10,000 this
season, and the end is not in sight.

Ice schooners are now busy running
from Miami to Nassau. A few iced
schooners are also being unloaded at
Miami.

Opium joints are causing some do-
mestic infelicity in Tampa. One man
found his wife under the influence and
a row followed.

The sum of \$4,500 has been sub-
scribed for the building of a hard road
from Ocala to Dunnellon, the total
cost to be \$7,000.

The plans for a new court house for
Putnam county are on exhibition at Pa-
latka. Now the plans to raise the
money are in order.

A tribe of the Improved Order of
Red Men has been organized at Fort
Myers. The new tribe is named Ca-
loosahatchee No. 31.

St. Petersburg will issue bonds for
\$50,000, to be used for needed improve-
ments. St. Petersburg is bound to lead
the west coast in progress.

Achias Bass of near Kissimmee has
purchased the estate of Tom Silas, con-
sisting of 200 acres of land, cattle, etc.,
paying \$17,500 for the same.

A fine grade of oil has been struck
at Orange Hill, Washington county, at
a depth of 125 feet. Drilling will con-
tinue in the hope of getting a gusher.

Harry Hopkins, baggageman on the
East Coast Railway, is the third one
to be arrested on the charge of pilfer-
ing baggage on transit. Hearing May
7th.

The business men and capitalists of
Tampa have organized a life insur-
ance company capitalized at \$500,000,
all paid in, and will apply for a char-
ter.

J. J. Griswell, a Tampa man, com-
mitted suicide at the Lindell Hotel,

James G. Jones, United States com-
missioner and deputy clerk of the
United States court at Key West, died
in that city on Sunday. He was 88
years old.

The Columbia county court con-
vened on Monday at Lake City, and it

himself and the county.

Rudolph Franck, an old resident of
DeLand, was accidentally shot while
going through bars at his orange grove,
the gun he was carrying being dis-
charged and the contents entering his
side. He died instantly.

Josh H. Morgan, the negro who was
confined in the Duval county jail on
the charge of drowning Will Evans
while en route from St. Augustine to
Jacksonville, has been released by the
St. Johns county authorities.

J. H. Mumford, a resident of Jack-
sonville, was arrested for being drunk
and disorderly. When locked up he
had a slash on the side of the head,
but it was not pronounced serious by
the jail physician. Later the man's
lifeless body was found in a cell. He
had bled to death.

By the slipping of a belt in the Jasper
Manufacturing Company's saw
mill on Saturday, a serious accident
happened. A colored boy 15 years old
was instantly killed and Engineer Mc-
Toney had his right arm torn off at
the elbow. He received other inju-
ries and may not recover.

their new field.


