

KEY WEST RAILWAY BILL PASSED SENATE

Senator Hudson Supports the Bill
as Amended.

MANY NEW BILLS PRESENTED

Senator Adams' Minority Report on Appropriations Adopted—Senator Brown Accused of Using Free Pass on East Coast Railway, Etc.

Tallahassee, April 27.—The Senate was occupied with the general appropriation bill at its opening session yesterday. The committee on appropriations presented its bill through Chairman Adams, accompanied by a minority report upon the subject of the fund from which money should be borrowed with which to pay the pension rolls. There is a deficit of \$140,000 in the pension fund. The majority report leaves it to the State government to pay this deficit from the general revenue fund. Senator Adams contended that there was no money in the general fund to meet this shortage, and he, therefore, submitted a minority report requiring that the pension fund deficit be met with money in the fund from the hire of State convicts.

Senator Adams' minority report brought out considerable discussion, Senator Orill contending that the minority report proposed shifting the burden of an honorable pension roll from the State to the counties.

After debate was called, and the minority report was adopted by a vote of 17 to 13.

Yeas—Messrs. Adams, Alford, Bailey, Brown, Canova, Clark, Crane, Crews, Davis, Faulkner, Harris, Massey, Neel, Newland, Scott, Wadsworth and Zim—17.

Nays—Mr. President, Blount, Carter, Orill, Gillen, Hudson, Humphries, Lee, McCreary, Raney, Sams, West and Wilson—13.

The Key West railway bill, as amended, with all the words after "Key West" in section 5 cut out, was taken up.

Senator Hudson said he thought the bill in its amended form was not objectionable, but asked another day to consider it. Motion lost and bill was placed on its third reading and passed.

On roll-call the vote was:

Nays—The president and Senator Blount; paired, Clark and Jackson against. Absent, Bailey and Davis.

On motion of Senator Harris the bill was immediately certified to the House, where it was referred to the committee on railroads, after the passage of a motion by Mr. Beckman, ordering 200 copies printed. The bill will be referred back to the House tomorrow.

A sensation was caused when Senator Bailey of Jefferson county introduced a resolution providing for the appointment of a committee of five Senators to investigate and report upon the facts in the case of the charge that Senator C. M. Brown has accepted a free pass from the Florida East Coast Railway. When the president of the Senate put the question on a viva voce vote some Senators voted no, but upon a rising vote, it was ordered unanimously that the matter be investigated.

Senator Brown made a lengthy explanation, in which he sought to excuse himself on the ground that he is employed as an emigration agent by the Florida East Coast Railway.

The following new bills were introduced:

Senator Massey—To amend the law relating to the carrying of firearms.

Senator Neel—Providing for the division of Holmes and the formation of Bloxham county.

Senator Crane—Relating to the crossing of railway tracks.


Senator Newland—To prohibit certain games and sports on Sundays.

Senator Bailey—Authorizing the State Board of Pensions to enroll the name of Joseph Gilmore on the pension roll.

Committee on Appropriations—Appropriation bill for the six months of 1905, the year 1906, and the first six months of 1907.

On motion of Senator Adams 300 copies of the bill were ordered printed.

Senator Gillen was appointed on the part of the Senate on the joint committee to visit and report upon the

In the House.

Tallahassee, April 27.—Two communications from Miami, one favoring and the other opposing the Key West railway extension, were received in the House yesterday.

Mr. Wells introduced a memorial to Congress to increase pensions of Seminole War veterans from \$8 to \$12 per month. Adopted.

Mr. Jewell offered a resolution asking Florida Congressmen to work for good roads movement.

New bills introduced:

Mr. Matthews of Bradford—To repeal the law allowing sheriffs and other police officers to carry concealed weapons without giving bond.

Mr. King of Dade—To amend the law organizing county court of Dade county.

Mr. Kirkland of Lake—To regulate carrying of concealed weapons, and providing a penalty therefor.

Mr. Wells of Hillsboro—To fix terms of trustees of special tax districts, and to provide the time, manner and conditions for holding elections for such trustees, and for voting a millage upon the taxable property in such districts for school purposes.

Committee on Appropriations—The general appropriation act to meet current expenses of State government from July 1, 1905, to June 30, 1907.

Mr. Sistrunk of Marion—To provide for official reporters in circuit courts and repeal existing laws on that subject.

Mr. Carter of Polk—Providing time in which express companies shall settle claims for goods lost or damaged by them in transit.

Mr. Dorman of Suwannee—To prohibit certain games and sports on Sundays. Baseball, football and horse races are the prohibited sports.

Mr. Hall of Suwannee—To require railroad companies to construct and keep in repair crossings of highways, and to guard the same in towns and cities.

Mr. Bryan of Washington—To amend law relative to local elections relative to the sale of liquors.

The bill regarding board of regents for colleges was made a special order for Thursday.

OUR NEW CHARTER BILL PASSED SENATE

Joint Committee of Legislature to
Visit East Florida Seminary.

PENSION BILL BECOMES LAW

Will Seriously Affect the Fine and Forfeiture Fund—Alachua Among the Counties to Suffer—Senator McCreary's School Bill Passed.

Tallahassee, April 27.—Senator Harris of Monroe and Representatives Wilson of Jackson and Dyal of Nassau have been appointed a committee to visit East Florida Seminary, and the committee will probably leave for Gainesville tomorrow.

The Senate appropriations bill, appropriating \$140,000 immediately from the fund arising from the hire of State convicts to pay pensions, passed the Senate today and was immediately certified to in the House. It is claimed the bill will seriously affect the fine and forfeiture fund and financial arrangements of many counties, including Alachua.

The Gainesville charter bill was put upon its third reading and was passed by the Senate this afternoon; also the McCreary bill regulating the attendance of non-residents in special tax school districts.
