The census of Gainesville, which is being taken at the time the names are being compiled for the new directory by Mr. Burtz, will be a surprise to many people. The increase will be far ahead of what many will anticipate, and the city's growth has been very flattering.

PERMANENT MILITARY CAMP.

The claims against the State that have been presented to the Legislature for the use of various armories throughout the State by the militia are no doubt the cause of the introduction of the bill in the House by Representative Stephens of Jackson, for a permanent military site. The bill is as follows:

"An act to provide for the appointment of a commission to select and recommend to the next Legislature suitable ground to be acquired as a permanent camp site for the Florida State troops.

"Whereas, It is recognized that the establishment of a permanent site for encampments of the Florida State Troops would be to the material advantage of the State, in that it would promote the efficiency of the militia, reduce the cost of assembling the troops and afford them necessary facilities and opportunities for more extended and thorough field exercises than they have hitherto been able to undertake; and

"Whereas, It is understood that should the State acquire land for such purpose and provide for its equipment and maintenance, the government of the United States would expend a generous amount to the erection of and construction of batteries for the instruction of coast artillery and of ride ranges for the encouragement of target practice; and

"Whereas, The grounds so acquired could be so laid out and maintained as not only to serve for military purposes, but to provide a creditable and extensive park or reservation; therefore,

"Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

"Section 1. That the Governor is hereby authorized and directed to appoint a commission, to consist of seven members, one of whom shall be a member of the Senate, two of the House of Representatives and the remainder of the commissioned officers of the Florida State Troops, one of the latter such officers to be a medical or sanitary officer, and another a competent engineer.

"Sec. 2. That it shall be the duty of the commission so appointed to investigate and report to the next Legislature the most available grounds which can be acquired by the State for the purpose of establishing a permanent site for the Florida State Troops, cost of same and such plan for equipping and preparing the grounds, and for their permanent maintenance as may seem best.

"Sec. 3. To meet any actual expenses which may be incurred by this commission in complying with the requirements of this bill, the sum of three hundred dollars, or as much thereof as may be required, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State treasury not otherwise appropriated.

"Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor."

General Lee was universally loved by the people of the whole United States, North as well as South, and his action at Havana, when he left there as the representative of his government at the outbreak of hostilities with Spain, won the admiration of every Northern man. "COMMODORE" STOCKWELL DEAD

At One Time He Was One of the Leading Financiers.

New York, May 3.—Alder B. Stockwell, once one of the leading financiers of the country, is dead at his home here. He was 72 years old.

"Commodore" Stockwell, as he was known, first came into prominence in 1871, when he became president of the Pacific Mail Steamship company. In 1872 he obtained a subsidy for the company, which was followed by a congressional investigation. In 1872 while he was president of three sewing machine companies, two railroads and the Pacific Mail company, Stockwell attempted to "bull" the stock of the latter and became financially involved. He finally went into bankruptcy and disappeared from the financial arena.

Auto Collides with Carriage.

Chicago, May 3.—An autoist whose machine last night crashed into a carriage driven by B. Clifford Loftis, a wholesale jeweler, throwing him to the ground and causing a fracture of the spine at the base of the skull, is now sought by the police. After the accident the chauffeur threw on full speed and escaped before persons who went to the victim's assistance could observe the number or secure a good description of the car. Mr. Loftis was left lying senseless in a strike crowd. His injuries may prove fatal.

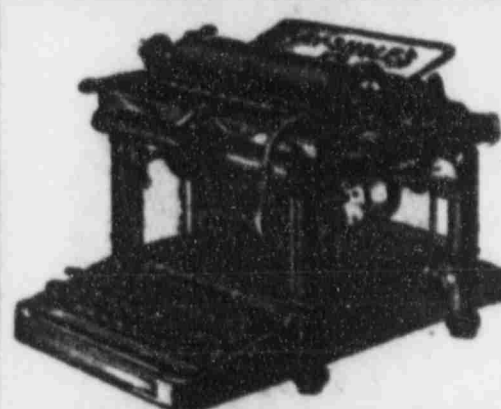
