

ALACHUA COUNTY R. F. D. ROUTE

First Route Was Inaugurated Monday—Others to Follow.

A VERY CONVENIENT SERVICE

Parties Residing in Rural Districts Will Now Enjoy Privileges of Daily Mail, Which Will Prove of Big Advantage and Profit.

Alachua county has at last the advantage of free rural delivery, the service having been inaugurated Monday in compliance with instructions from the postoffice department, United States government.

This will be known as Rural Free Delivery, Route 1, and extends from Gainesville via North Gainesville to Bennington, Rutledge and intermediate points, returning via Arredondo. S. J. Burnett, Jr., has been appointed carrier, and considering the fact that Monday was the first day everything worked smoothly. Departure was made from the Gainesville postoffice at eight o'clock, the carrier returning a few minutes before four.

There are about 180 families on this route, which covers an area of about thirty square miles.

Report is made by the carrier that a number of families to be served have not installed boxes. This is one of the most rigid requirements of the department, as the carrier is forbidden to deliver mail other than registered matter except in the boxes. These parties will be required to install receptacles of this kind before they will be permitted to enjoy the privilege.

By this service parties residing in the country have the advantage of a daily mail, with the exception of Sunday, which is not only a big accommodation but of great value to the truckers and others depending upon the markets.

Other routes will be established when the proper petitions are signed and forwarded to Postmaster Arnow, who will take the matter up with the department.

SUNDAY MEALS.

Do Not Overeat and You Will Feel Better on Monday.

If it is desired to begin the week refreshed and ready for labor, rested in mind and body, the eating customs of Sunday will have to be readjusted. Have a later breakfast, if desired, but have then a very light one even if you are hungry, or, if it must be hearty, then do not upset your digestive habits any more than may be avoided and have but two meals on that day and eat no other. It would be far better to have three light meals, lighter than usual, if that could be arranged to fit with the other household arrangements. The custom of noon dinner on that day arises from the usual absence of cook or maid at the later one, and this may be unavoidable. Very well, then; treat this as a rest day for cook and digestive apparatus as well as from other labors. Have a light breakfast, a light dinner and a chafing dish supper as near the ordinary hours of meals as possible and remember as you are going to take less exercise than usual you demand a lesser amount of more easily digested food.—Helen Johnson in Good Housekeeping.

The Nourishing Chestnut.

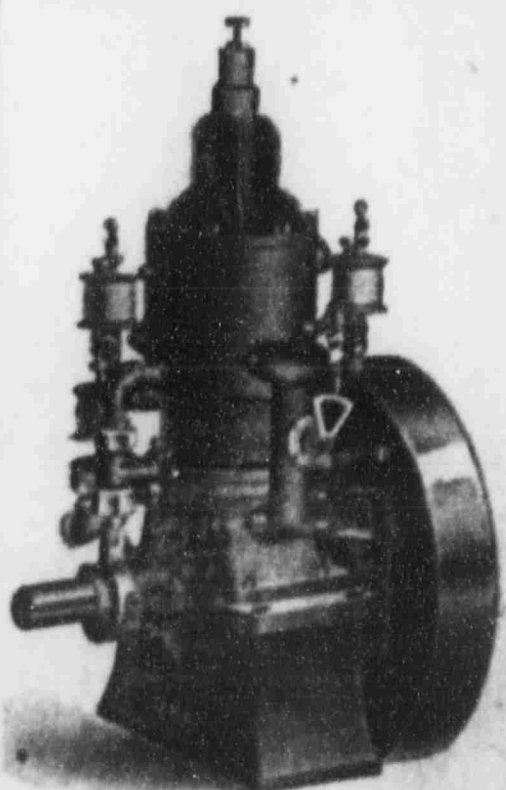
The London Lancet finds that the chestnut is the most digestible nut and cannot only take the place of the potato, as in France, where chestnuts, boiled and mashed like potatoes, make a delicious dish, but in reality they are a more perfect form of food. According to the Lancet's analysis of the potato and the chestnut, the latter contains less water, more proteid, more fat and starch, but less mineral matter, than the potato and is more digestible than the latter. Like the potato, also, its nutritive and digestive qualities are greatest when baked or roasted.
