L. B. Sutton has leased and will operate the Mercer saw mill at Columbus in a few weeks.

The new city administration of Live Oak is expected to make many improvements in that city.

Daniel Henry Chase, the oldest graduate of Wesleyan university, and who as valedictorian of his class, that of 1833, received the first diploma issued by the then newly founded New Wesleyan college, died today in his 91st year, at Middletown, Conn.

The Standard Oil company of New Jersey has declared a dividend for the quarter of \$9 a share, payable June 15. The previous dividend declared by the company in March was \$15 a share, and at this time last year a dividend of \$8 a share was declared.

Being Held in Buffalo—Mayor Delivers Welcome Address.

Buffalo, May 16.—The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen convened here today with a large majority of the delegates present. Mayor Knight delivered an address of welcome, which was responded to by P. H. Morrissey, grand master of the organization.

It is expected that the committee on credentials will occupy the entire day. The order now has 726 lodges, each represented by a delegate and with alternates. This evening there will be a public meeting at which Governor Higgins is expected to be present and deliver an address.

When the evidence was all in, Judge Swayne instructed the jury to bring in a verdict of not guilty, saying that the assistant postmaster had followed the rules of the department.

Oconto, Wis., May 16.—Following the discovery of a shortage in his accounts that is said to be between \$75,000 and \$100,000, the body of Louis J. Bens, a trusted employee of the McBehron company, was found in an abandoned barn near this place. He had shot himself in the head. Bens had been agent of the company for 20 years.
