

DR. LINDSAY'S IMPRESSIVE SERMON

Methodist Church Was Crowded to Hear This Eminent Divine.

SUBJECT WAS ON EDUCATION

Delivered the Commencement Sermon for the East Florida Seminary and Brought Out Many Fine Points Which Were Eloquently Rendered.

One of the largest and probably most intelligent aggregations assembled at Kavanaugh Methodist Church for several years was the congregation which greeted Rev. W. C. Lindsay, the eminent divine of Ocala, Sunday morning, the occasion being the commencement sermon of East Florida Seminary, which was to be delivered by Dr. Lindsay.

In addition to the regular congregation of the Methodist church, which is possibly the largest in the city, there were the cadets and young lady students of the Seminary and the congregations of the First Presbyterian and First Baptist churches, as well as friends of the churches, with the result that a half hour before the hour announced for service it was difficult to procure a seat.

Dr. Lindsay took his text from Acts 22:3, "Brought up in this city at the feet of Galileo," from which he delivered one of the most eloquent and most impressive discourses ever heard in this city.

The sermon was naturally an educational one and touched upon educational lines. For forty minutes the speaker commanded the closest attention; and at the conclusion of the service was warmly congratulated.

In part Dr. Lindsay said: "It used to be the boast of a great many backwoods preachers that they had never 'rubbed their backs against college walls.' I have heard of them calling Onesimus 'One Simus,' etc. There was in those days a prejudice against learning. Many seemed to think that as people grew in power, and held deep, broad and clear views of things mundane, that they lost fervor and piety. It was a disgrace for a minister ever to have looked into a Greek or Hebrew book.

"Of all the men who ever lived, Paul's influence has been the mightiest in shaping the destiny of the world. In carrying out far-reaching plans for the conversion of men and the upbuilding of Christ's kingdom he stands head and shoulders above all other apostles. His power and efficiency as a Christian worker was due in a large measure to his superior education and intelligence—to the fact that he was brought up at the feet of Galileo, the most renowned Jewish educator of that day.

"A man need not blush today to confess that he has 'rubbed his back against college walls;' yet a tendency—and I believe a growing tendency—to undervalue thorough education, is quite as common today. In the rush and bustle of our strenuous life, too many are satisfied with a superficial knowledge of things. Some look at the question wholly from a standpoint of dollars and cents. They forget that money is not worth living for; that it can never satisfy the soul and make a map happy. It is foolish—suicidal—to neglect and dwarf the mind in order that the pocket-book might be filled and the bank account swelled. There are some things more valuable than money, and education is one of them. It brings with it advantages that are beyond all price. Let us consider some of them:

"A good education broadens one. Narrow-mindedness is one of the worst things in the world. In all ages it has been the enemy of progress.

"A liberal education tends to soften human nature. It enlarges and enriches the mind; it expands the soul. Under its influence the mean, sordid, selfish spirit is cast out and nature becomes generous and noble. If you doubt this, glance at the history of the nations, and even the church. As education becomes more general among the masses, wars grow less frequent. People find something better to do than to set out to butcher one another. Courts of arbitration take the place of swords and cannon as a means of settling disputes.

"By withholding education from the masses, Romanism has cast her withering blight over Spain, Italy, Austria, Ireland and all other nations where her influence is predominant. As education becomes more general, and of a higher order, the power of Rome is broken. Free discussion, a free press and free schools take the place of a

priestly censorship; instruction and persuasion take the place of the rack and the thumbscrew.

"Every young man and woman should determine, however great the difficulties in the way, whatever the cost in self-denial and hard work, to secure a liberal education.

I have never heard of one, and I do know that some college graduates die paupers; but you will find ten thousand ignoramuses among the destitute for one educated man. You may find a few ignorant millionaires, but the great majority of the well-to-do and prosperous are intelligent, educated people.

"Boys and girls, if you want to make success sure, get an education. It gives you a keener mind and a clearer head. It fits you for the personal management of an extensive business. Many a one has swamped for want of a disciplined mind and a clever head with which to manage his affairs. It promotes a habit of prudence and economy.

"A good education also enables you to command higher wages for your work. The cashier in the bank may have to practice more self-denial at first than the man who labors for a dollar and a half a day on the street; but the cashier will come out in the end, because he improves his hours in the evenings, when the laborer is but enjoying a portion of his day's earnings.

sickness and old age. That is the result of education.

"The people who hold the power and the wealth of every land are the educated and the intelligent. The ignorant in all ages have been the hewers of wood and the drawers of water for the intelligent, and what has been true in the past will be true in the future."

Dr. Lindsay said many things of deep interest to his hearers, and his sermon will long be remembered by those present. He proved himself a fine speaker, and the management of the Seminary felt complimented that he had consented to deliver the commencement sermon for 1905.
