In fifteen minutes the water will have completely evaporated and every grain be distinct and fluffy. Not a grain will stick to the bottom of the sauce-pan. Rice cooked this way is a revelation.

EAST COAST CANAL.

By the inserting of a paragraph in the bill extending the time for the completion of the Florida Coast Line and Transportation Company canal, the present Legislature insures the construction of an extension of the canal from St. Augustine to the St. Johns river, or the forfeit on the part of the company of 100,000 acres of land. The amendments adopted and incorporated in the bill are as follows:

"Provided, That 100,000 acres of the average lands now held in reserve on account of the uncompleted portion of the canals and waterways of said company from mile twenty-four to mile one hundred and twenty-six south from St. Augustine shall continue to be held in reserve by the trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund of the State of Florida until the completion of said canal and waterways from St. Augustine to the St. Johns river in accordance with the specifications prescribed in section 3 of chapter 3095, acts of 1889, Laws of Florida. The said work on said canals and waterways between St. Augustine and the St. Johns river shall be commenced not later than the date of the completion of the canals and waterways now being constructed by said company to St. Augustine and shall be prosecuted continuously thereafter until completed.

"And provided further, That in the event the said canal company shall at any time desire to sell its canal, the State of Florida shall have the refusal.

"And provided further, That neither said above provisions in reference to said 100,000 acres nor the acceptance thereof by said company, nor the provision that the State of Florida shall have the refusal in the event the said company desire to sell, shall be so construed as to in anywise interfere with, alter, change, or impair any rights, property, privileges, grants, franchises of said company now existing or the extensions thereof herein and hereby provided, except as to the 100,000 acres of land as herein above mentioned."

REPRESENTATIVE DYAL DEAD.

The news of the death of Hon. Burt G. Dyal at Moniac, Ga., on Tuesday, May 30th, came like a shock to his many friends, although it was known he was seriously ill.

Deceased was one of the best known and popular men in East Florida, where the naval stores business had earned for him a handsome fortune. He was a self-made man and a progressive citizen. Born in Georgia in 1851, he came to Florida in 1867, settling in Nassau county, his home being at Dyal.

He was a member of the present Legislature and was serving his fifth term as a member of the House of Representatives. His colleagues in the House passed resolutions of sympathy on his serious illness the day previous to his death.

Cost of Free Delivery.

Washington, May 31.—The superintendent of city free delivery has laid before Postmaster General Cortelyou a statement on curious features of the city free delivery. Taking the service by states, New York heads the list with 100 free delivery postoffices, which is more than the whole country 30 years ago. Pennsylvania is second, with 94, and Ohio third, with 73. The percentage of cost of the carriers' service in chief cities is: New York, 12.27; Chicago, 15.63; Philadelphia, 24.05; Boston, 21.86; Baltimore, 25.26; Cincinnati, 17.91.
