

COUNTY DRY AS A BONE

That County Tuesday
Success for Temperance.

UNITY WILL REACH TO 300

For a Hard and Strenuous Campaign
Election Came to Close—Every Precinct
in County Said to Have Voted
Dry—Saloons Close Today.

The wet and dry election in Bradford
county, which was pulled off Tuesday
after an exciting and strenuous cam-
paign on the part of both sides, result-
ed in a decided victory for the drys, to
whom the wets conceded a majority in
the county of about 300.

It is stated that every precinct in the
county went dry, although the vote in
some was rather close. In Starke, the
county seat, the majority for the drys
was only three, while Lawtey piled up
the same result.

A letter from Starke to a party in
this city, dated the 21st inst., bears in-
formation that the saloons will close
at noon today.

With the success of the drys in Brad-
ford every county from Duval to the
Gulf at Cedar Key will be dry and
those who desire to refresh themselves
with a little "enthusiasm" will find it
necessary to purchase tickets to Jack-
sonville.

dele, Ga.


Cordele, Ga., June 21.—About one

A WONDER OF RANGUN.

The Great Shony Dagon Pagoda Cov-
ered With Pure Gold.

Rangun, the principal city of Bur-
ma, grew up around the sacred spot
on which is built the great Shony Da-
gon pagoda, one of its principal won-
ders. "Rising to a height of 300 feet,
its size is greatly enhanced by the fact
that it stands on an eminence that is
itself 100 feet above the level of the
city," says a writer. "It is covered
with pure gold from base to summit,
and once in every generation this gold
is completely renewed by public sub-
scription. Yet throughout the inter-
val the process of regilding goes on
perpetually. Pious people who seek in
this way to express their veneration
and to add to their store of spiritual
merit climb up daily with little flut-
tering packets of gold leaf, which they
fasten on some fraction of its great
surface. There is no more picturesque
sight offered by it than that of a group
of these silken worshippers outlined high
against its gold in the act of contrib-
uting their small quota to its splendor.
The pagoda itself has no interior. It
is a solid stupa of brick raised over a
relic chamber."
