

**FATAL TRAGEDY

**Ludlow Shot and Fatally
Wounded Near Place.**

Ludlow is Alleged to Have Been Too Intimate With the Female Friend of Henry Jackson, and the End Resulted Fatally.

A communication from Newberry states that on Saturday night, at the wood camp about three miles from that place, Joe Ludlow and Henry Jackson became involved in a row over Jackson's woman.

Ludlow seems to have gotten the best of his antagonist, since Jackson was shot twice through the left shoulder, and is seriously wounded. He was also shot through the lower abdomen, and it is thought he cannot live.

Ludlow made a safe escape after doing the shooting, and up to the time of the writing of the communication has not been apprehended.

All parties are colored, but are well known in that section, having been employed in the phosphate mines and serpentine camps of the West End for several years.

SENATOR DENIES BRIBERY.

Arkansas Legislator Says He Did Not Sell His Vote.

Little Rock, July 3.—No conclusion was reached in the trial of Senator A. W. Covington, on a charge of accepting a bribe of \$6,000 on the new state capitol bill at the recent session of the legislature. The state closed and presentation of testimony for the defense began. Senator Covington testified in his own behalf. He denied with emphasis that he received a cent from anyone to influence his vote.

"If I did," he declared, "I hope I may never see my wife and babies again, gentlemen."

The state rested this morning after having introduced testimony attempting to show that Senator Covington received \$2,500 for which he was to try and obtain a favorable report from the special architect on the capitol work. The defense tried to show that M. D. L. Cook, who testified that he paid \$2,500 to Senator Covington, was threatened with indictment when he was called before the grand jury, but there was no direct testimony on this point.

Members of the state capitol commission testified that the motive in asking for an appropriation of \$800,000 for the completion of the new capitol was to have the building ready within two years and that the estimate was based on the special architect's report.

NEW BUG NOT BOLL WEEVIL.

Georgia Entomologist Investigates a New Insect Found in that State.

Atlanta, July 3.—State Entomologist R. I. Smith returned from Laurens county, where he has been looking into the matter of the ravages of the newly found cotton beetle, which was thought by many to be the cotton boll weevil, which has done so much damage in Texas and other western cotton states.

Mr. Smith states positively that this beetle is not the Mexican weevil, though it is doing a great deal of damage to the cotton wherever it is found. The bug eats out the squares and blooms until they fall off. In some instances Mr. Smith found as many as 25 of these beetles on one bloom and 50 or more on a single leaf.

Reports of the ravages of this beetle, which, for want of a better common name, have come from Laurens, Dooly, Irwin, Emanuel, Wilcox, Telfair and several other counties. It was reported in Coffee county last year, but has not been found there this year.

Entomologist Smith recommends the dusting of the cotton plant with a mixture of paris green and lime to eradicate the pest, practically the same mixture as is used for the cotton caterpillar.
