

CHANGES FOR TRAIN SERVICE

Atlantic Coast Line Will Operate Solid Trains Through Here.

SERVICE WILL BE REALLY FINE

The inauguration of This Service Will Mean a General Change of Operation of Trains Between High Springs, Gainesville and Rochelle.

Work on the Atlantic Coast Line "Y" at Alachua, which will connect the Jacksonville and Southwestern divisions with the High Springs-Rochelle line, is progressing nicely under direction of Chas. W. Wells, who has the contract for grading, etc. Mr. Wells states that the grading will be completed by Tuesday of the coming week.

Iron has been laid from the High Springs track to the public road near Burnett's pond, a distance of about half a mile, and only a quarter of a mile is yet to complete, the iron being on the ground for that purpose. It is estimated that by the end of next week the entire work will have been accomplished.

When this "Y" is completed, the curious are guessing just what will follow. It is a well established fact that the Atlantic Coast Line proposes to operate through trains from St. Petersburg to Jacksonville via Gainesville and Alachua, and that the service will be good, but the question arises as to how soon this will be done. There is a diversity of opinion on this matter, and inasmuch as those who possess the information are reluctant to divulge it, the public can do nothing but keep surmising as to the future.

The inauguration of this through service will lessen the distance between Jacksonville and St. Petersburg nearly forty miles, as it will save the extra distance now covered in the L shaped trip from Rochelle to Jacksonville via Palatka. The distance between Gainesville and Jacksonville via the Atlantic Coast Line will also be considerably shortened, being only a few miles further than by the Seaboard Air Line.

Naturally this new service will materially affect the schedules of trains into this city at present. It will virtually annul the train from High Springs to Rochelle, but will necessitate a schedule either between High Springs and Gainesville or High Springs and Alachua. The schedule will probably be arranged between this city and High Springs for the convenience of patrons of the road who desire to visit Gainesville for the purpose of trading or other business.

It will be necessary to place a service between Palatka and Rochelle, which will probably make a round trip daily between the two points.
