A wet and dry election for Marion county is said to be among the possibilities in the near future.

The Tampa authorities say that the slot machines that have been run in that city must be shipped out of the State.

A gambling house was raided in Key West a few days ago and a bolito and roulette outfit, together with \$300 in money, were captured.

The latest reports from Pensacola are to the effect that the clerk, Dansby, shot by W. F. Williams, will recover. Williams is said to be crazy.

Pension Roll is Decreasing. Topeka, Kans., July 22.—The Topeka pension agency, which handles the business of Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Indian Territory and Oklahoma, has 115,365 pensioners on the rolls, a net loss of 252 for the year.
