

PROBABILITY OF BIG STRIKE.

10,000 Bridge Workers May Quit Work All Over Country.

New York, August 3.—In all probability there will be, says the World today, a national strike against the American Bridge company. Should the strike be called, more than 50,000 men will be involved.

The workers attribute the trouble to the alleged employment of nonunion men by the Boston Bridge company. Frank Buchanan, president of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers arrived in Gainesville yesterday and will make his headquarters here during the controversy.

It is very possible, he said, that the strike will take place. I can do nothing for a day or two except to wait for developments. Should the strike be ordered it will have the assistance of the international union and other labor organizations.

A statement was made in behalf of the American Bridge company which says: "We have not been officially informed about the trouble in New Haven, but we have the right to submit our work and have no right to impose conditions on the subject contractors further than a guarantee that they must do the work properly. We have an agreement with the union to employ only union men when we do the work directly, but in sub-letting work he can only choose the lowest bidder, if it is a responsible firm. If the union choose a sub-contractor that it is for his best advantage to employ only union men, that is a question between the union and him."

WITTE IN PERFECT HEALTH.

Russia's Envoy Talks About His Visit to America.

On Board Steamer Kaiser William Der Grosse, via Wireless Telegraph Station at Siasconnet, Mass., August 3.—After a good passage across the Atlantic, Sergius Witte, Russian peace commissioner, is in perfect health, in speaking of his approaching arrival on American soil, Mr. Witte said: "I am happy to visit America, which country I am most anxious to know. My only regret is that I cannot speak English as I should like thoroughly to appreciate the country whose progress and development are so interesting and instructive. I shall also be glad to have personal intercourse with President Roosevelt, who has reached such a prominent position as a statesman, and to present him the greetings of Emperor Nicholas. It has been stated that I am to test the ground for floating a Russian loan in America and discuss the relations between the two countries especially regarding commercial affairs. My only mission is the negotiation for peace, but I am quite ready to express my personal opinion on questions affected the relations between Russia and America, with a view to further strengthening the traditional friendly feeling between St. Petersburg and Washington."

MURDERED FOR HIS MONEY.

New Orleans Watchman Victim of Robbers—Big Reward Offered.

New Orleans, August 3.—Early today the body of Ignatius Feltzinger, a night watchman employed by the Boylan agency, detailed on duty at the Alcus box factory at Water and Napoleon avenues, was found floating in the river under circumstances which pointed to one of the most coldblooded murder atrocities ever committed in this country.

Robbery was the motive of the crime, and was evidently committed by two or more men. One of the assassins used a heavy oak stick and had struck the watchman a blow on the head fracturing the skull. The other used a razor or some other keen instrument as the left index finger was nearly severed by it.

The only clue to the crime left by the assassins was the bloody stick with which the crime was committed. A pool of blood in the factory showed where the crime was committed.

The body was placed on a truck and wheler to the river about 100 feet distant, and then thrown down a vault into the murky waters below.

Fretzinger is said to have had about \$30 on his person before leaving his home. The money and the pocket-book were missing, also a cheap watch and chain.

A reward of \$250 has been offered by the Alcus Box company and an additional \$150 has been offered by the Boylan agency for any information leading to the apprehension of the guilty parties.
