

MONTHLY MEETING COUNTY SOLONS

Number of Persons Granted Licenses According to Law.

WAS A VERY BUSY SESSION

Many Bills Were Paid, the Proportion of Fees in Inquest Cases Being Very Large—Many Applications for New Roads and Changes of Roads.

Gainesville, Aug. 1.

The Board of County Commissioners met this day in regular session. Present: J. G. Osteen, C. C. Pedrick, F. F. Paulling and J. F. Townsend. Chairman Dampier being absent, on motion of J. F. Townsend, C. C. Pedrick was elected chairman pro tem.

It was ordered that Alex McDowell be sent to the poor farm.

That the sum of \$150 be appropriated and paid to F. H. Clyatt for road purposes, to be used on the Tacoma and Gainesville road.

That The Gainesville Sun be designated as the paper in which to publish the acts of the last Legislature of 1905.

That J. R. Smith be appointed inspector of marks and brands for District No. 5, to enter upon duty after giving bond.

Whereupon the board adjourned until Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock.
