

ALACHUA COUNTY WILL BE AT FAIR

County Commissioners Act Favorably Upon Sending Exhibit.

PEOPLE MUST GET TO WORK

Alachua, One of the Richest and Most Diversified in the State, Will Show to the World What a Fine Country We Have—Tax Assessments.

The Board of County Commissioners were in special session Monday. Although this session was called for the purpose of hearing complaints of property owners on the raising of assessments, the board generously consented to take up and discuss the Florida State Fair and the matter of sending an exhibit from Alachua county. This fair, which will be held in Tampa from Nov. 18 to 30 of the present year, will be the biggest and best ever seen in Florida and is destined to accomplish great good in advertising the State and those counties which manifest sufficient enterprise to send exhibits.

Mayor W. R. Thomas, Councilman W. B. Taylor, and Jesse E. Burtz, vice-president of the Florida Mid-Winter State Fair Association, appeared before the board in the interest of the Fair Association and the people of Alachua county, laying out a plan of organization, and asking the cooperation and financial aid of the commissioners for the purpose of defraying the expense of collecting the exhibits and displaying same at Tampa. A communication from Mr. Burtz suggested the appointment of a number of fair commissioners throughout the county, the duty of whom it shall be to solicit exhibits from individuals, manufacturers, etc., and later the employment of a competent man, on salary, to collect the exhibits and see that they are properly packed for shipment, and to accompany them to the fair and superintend the exhibit. The suggestion was most favorably received, and the board disposed of the matter at this meeting by assuring the committee that an appropriation of \$1000 would be made at the next regular meeting, provided a fair association would be organized in the county by that time to manage the affair. This association will be formed and well organized before the September meeting of the board, when the commissioners will be appointed.

Alachua county, one of the richest and most diversified in the State, can and will make a fine showing at the Fair. With her rich mineral deposits, her cotton, her naval stores and timber, her manufacturing, cattle, agriculture and horticulture, her educational interests, etc., no county in the State can furnish a finer or more extensive general exhibit, and her people propose to show to the world what can be produced here.

Our brothers in South Florida may depend upon it that Alachua county will be at the Fair, and it need not be surprising if we should walk away with that \$2,000 premium for the best general county exhibit. We have the products and the grit and the energy, and we are going to concentrate them all between now and the 15th of November.

A large number of property owners appeared before the Board with grievances upon raising the assessment, and in many instances the assessments were reduced.

ALACHUA'S FIRST BALE.

It Was Shipped to Savannah Monday by Charles A. Williams.

Alachua, Aug 8—Charles A. Williams, Alachua's leading cotton buyer, today shipped to Savannah, Georgia, the first bale of Sea Island cotton, supposed to have been shipped from Florida. The bale was ginned Monday by W. C. Eaves & Son. Mr. Williams offered five cents per pound for seed cotton for ten days, which offer is out on the 9th. He is in the cotton business to stay and will make things lively this fall. His fall goods are arriving daily and, assisted by W. V. Roberts, is fitting up one of the finest first-class hardware stores to be found in the State. In addition to hardware he will carry a complete line of buggies and wagons, coffins and caskets.

Stated That Stockholder in G. S. & F. Is in the Deal.

OWNS ONE-THIRD OF G. & G.

It is Believed That Construction Southward Will Begin at Early Day and Will Not be Completed Until Gulf Outlet is Reached at Tampa.

The Tampa Morning Tribune Tuesday wired The Sun as follows:

"The Tribune has reliable information that J. N. Tiller of Ocala, a partner of A. P. Stucky, is interested in the Georgia Southern and Florida Railroad, and also owns one-third of the stock of the Gainesville and Gulf."

This would tend to strengthen the rumor and the general belief which has been current upon the streets of Gainesville that the new owners of the Gainesville and Gulf propose to extend the road southward without delay, with Tampa as the proposed southern terminal. By this extension the road would not only traverse the richest and most fertile section of Florida, but would pass through many prosperous and growing towns and cities of South Florida, affording a new and much nearer and more convenient outlet for the public to the West. As the roads now run, there is only one gateway out of Florida from many of these points, and that is Jacksonville. The completion of the Gainesville and Gulf to Tampa would lessen the distance between Tampa and Macon nearly a hundred miles, which would mean a saving of from three to four hours between the points, to say nothing of the convenience. The road will also traverse a fine timber section, and would offer manufacturers of lumber and naval stores a new and prosperous field which heretofore has remained undeveloped for lack of transportation facilities.

The purchasers of the road are recognized as being among the leading and most conservative business men in the State, and that they will make marked improvement in the service at once there is no doubt. It is learned that the track already in operation will be strengthened, heavier iron will take the place of that now in use, heavier locomotives and more modern passenger coaches will be placed in commission, and in all the change will be a revelation.

The officers of the company under the new organization are S. F. Parrott of the Georgia Southern & Florida, president; A. P. Stucky of Ocala, first vice-president; B. W. Blunt of Ocala, second vice-president; F. M. Simonton of Tampa, secretary; H. E. Taylor of Gainesville, treasurer; L. E. Barker of Gainesville, superintendent; W. S. Banks of Gainesville, auditor. It is understood that the other employees of the old organization will retain their respective positions.

The general offices of the company will remain in Gainesville indefinitely, which will be gratifying information to the public.
