THE BOND TRUSTEES.

City Council Names Trustees for Two Important Funds.

The City Council, having passed the educational and sewerage, lighting and street bond ordinances, have selected trustees of these funds as follows:

For educational bond fund—E. Baird, J. S. Bodiford and Christopher Matheson, all for one year.

For sewerage, lighting and streets—W. W. Hampton, five years; H. F. Dutton, four years; S. J. Thomas, three years; W. N. Wilson, two years; Perry M. Colson, one year.

These trustees will have charge of all the funds derived for the purposes specified, which will be an assurance that same will be properly handled, as each is a conservative agent. In the hands of these boards the people may feel assured that the funds will be properly and judiciously expended.

LITTLE POSSIBILITY OF VERDICT

Jury in Sanford Case Has Been Out Over Six Days.

Rome, Ga., August 10.—After having been out for six days there seems to be little possibility of the jury reaching a verdict in the Sanford case. There have been no new developments today and the jury is still out by the decision of Judge Wright, who last night ordered the jury back after it had notified the court that it could not agree on a verdict.

Judge Wright has stated that he would keep the jury together at least during the day and that he might keep the jurors together longer. It is stated that the court has not fully made up his mind in regard to when he would declare a mistrial in the case.

The many rumors in regard to the possible finding of the jury have narrowed down now to the opinion that a verdict of manslaughter will probably be returned, if any verdict is reached. It is understood that two of the jurors favor a verdict of acquittal, and that the delay in reaching a decision has been caused by the holding out of the jurors who favor granting Sanford his liberty.

Large Increase in Tax Returns.

Atlanta, August 10.—Forty million dollars, that is the figure now set by Captain W. H. Harrison for the probable aggregate gains in tax returns in the 137 counties of the state of Georgia. Up to Wednesday the digests of 118 counties had been received, showing net gains aggregating \$32,555,890 or over \$7,000,000 in excess of what was at first estimated as the total gains for the whole state.
