

ENERGETIC CITIZENS ARE NOW ORGANIZED

Enthusiastic Meeting Was Held Here Monday Afternoon.

A FAIR ASSOCIATION FORMED

Officers and Board of Directors Elected and Alachua County is Assured of a Fine Exhibit at Tampa's Florida State Fair.

The Alachua County Fair Association has been launched and it was launched in good shape, too.

A meeting of representative business and professional men who have the interests of the county at heart were present Monday afternoon for the purpose of organizing an association, the object of which is to encourage a county exhibit at the Florida State Fair to be held in Tampa from November 15th to November 30th of the present year.

Jesse E. Burtz, vice-president for Alachua county of the Florida State Fair-Winter Fair Association, called the meeting to order and explained the purpose for which this association should be organized. He explained that the Board of County Commissioners had assured an appropriation of \$1000 for the purpose of defraying the expenses of collecting exhibits and displaying them properly at the State Fair, and that with the united efforts of a conservative, organized body, there was no reason why Alachua county could not make a fine showing at the fair, being one of the wealthiest and most diversified in the State. For the information of those present Mr. Burtz gave an outline of the plan of organization, which was followed.

The meeting was organized by the suggestion of L. C. Lynch as temporary chairman, when the following permanent officers of the association were elected:

President, W. R. Thomas; L. C. Lynch, vice-president; Willis W. Colson, secretary; Dr. Benj. P. Richards, treasurer.

The question of the election of a board of directors, through which the executive affairs of the association should be carried out, was discussed, and it was decided to have a board of five directors, five to constitute a quorum. The following were elected unanimously: C. C. Pedrick, J. A. Pifer, Dr. E. Lartigue, Dr. T. F. Thomas, W. B. Taylor, Dr. J. F. McKinstry, Jr., H. H. McCreary, J. F. Jones and John W. Tench. The duty of the board will be to assume entire charge of the executive work in the matter of securing and taking care of the exhibits. The members of this board are among Gainesville's most energetic citizens, and no better selection could have been made.

The board will meet at the office of Secretary W. W. Colson in the court house at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon, when fair commissioners will be appointed from various sections of the county and their duties outlined.

There was a great deal of interest manifested at the meeting Monday afternoon.

The association will co-operate with the Burtz representing the State Fair Association, in the matter of having the county properly and thoroughly represented.

CHEAP EXCURSION.

Seaboard Air Line Railway Will Sell Tickets to Mountain and Seashore. Washington is Also Included in the Cheap Rate—Double Daily Service.

The Seaboard Air Line Railway announces exceptionally low excursion rates for the annual excursion to the mountains of Carolina, the seashore of Virginia and to Washington, D. C., Wednesday, August 16th.

The round-trip rate from Jacksonville to Lincolnton, Marion and Ruthersfordton, S. C., is \$13, with corresponding rates to other western North Carolina resorts. To Wrightsville Beach the Seaboard will also sell round-trip tickets at rate of \$12.

To the Virginia coast resorts, Ocean View, Old Point Comfort and Virginia Beach, rate will be \$15.50 for the round-trip. The rate to Old Point Comfort will apply via Portsmouth, or via Richmond.

The Seaboard has also arranged to sell tickets from Jacksonville to Washington, D. C., and return on August 16th at rate of \$22.60. All tickets sold for this excursion will be good on trains scheduled to leave Jacksonville at 9:05 a. m. and 7:50 p. m., with final limit returning to August 31st, 1905.

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
