Polk county is bound to have the \$2,000 prize at the Tampa Fair if it costs them \$2,500.

Joe Hogan was arrested at Madison and taken to Tallahassee, charged with stealing \$40 from a car.

The Dannelon high school will open Monday, September 4th, with a full complement of teachers.

The motor boats all along the East Coast will be more numerous than ever this winter. It is a craze.

A schooner lying at a dock in Jacksonville was robbed Sunday night. The schooner was not taken.

Several new boats will be built for the lake at Leesburg, to be used during the tourist season this winter.

Burglars entered the house of J. H. Lanier at Whittier and stole four trunks. They were found a short distance from the house.

A stock company has been organized at Brooksville with sufficient capital to build a first-class tourist hotel. The capital stock is \$25,000, and ex-Governor Jennings is president.

Editor Isaac of The Fort Myers Press has been contributing some very interesting articles to his paper from his observations made in California on his trip with the press gang.

Greater Tampa has been compelled to let go their hold on Fort Brooke and the ground is that a part of the corporation could not be so taken without taking the entire incorporation.

The Atlantic Coast Line will build a large passenger depot at St. Petersburg. A freight house will also be erected. A large hotel is to be put up and will be a first-class tourist resort.

Jeff Bruten, a negro who had been released from a convict camp, stole \$478 from J. D. Barber of Barberville, Volusia county, last Thursday. He was caught and most of the money recovered by Sheriff Turner.

J. P. Latimer, a negro, was arrested Sunday night at Plant City for shooting another negro named Davie in the abdomen. The wound is not serious. Latimer claims that a number of negroes were playing with pistols, when he happened to get one that was loaded and it went off, shooting the other negro.

Mose Larkins was allowed to visit his cousin Nelson Larkins in the Jacksonville jail, who is awaiting execution day for the Eppes murder. Before Mose got inside he was examined and a revolver found on his person. He had evidently intended it for Nelson. Mose was held for toting a pistol.

Frank G. Parnell of Jacksonville was most brutally murdered Saturday night, and his body thrown in a pond near the waterworks pumphouse. Several arrests have been made and Earl Bennett was with Parnell during the night. Parnell leaves a wife and three small children. Lawrence W. Mullahey was also with Parnell and all were drinking.

AMERICANS SEE BULL FIGHT.

Taft and Party Royally Entertained by the Filipinos.

Jolo, August 16, via Manila, August 21.—(Delayed).—Secretary Taft and party arrived here at noon and immediately proceeded to the parade ground to witness an elaborate program arranged for their entertainment. The sultan of Sulu, with his retinue, and other Moro dignitaries, occupied seats on the grand stand along with Secretary Taft and Miss Roosevelt.

Thousands of Moros, residents of Jolo, and from the neighboring islands were present to take part in the festivities, which were wonderfully picturesque. In the afternoon there were caraboo and bull fights.

Secretary Taft and Miss Roosevelt were presented with many Moro presents by the sultan who offered his hand in marriage to Miss Roosevelt and would make her sultana of the Sulu archipelago, saying that his people desired her to remain among them.

While some of the party were bathing in the afternoon, Frederick O'Brien, editor of the Cable News, was seized with cramps, and the under tow was rapidly carrying him out to sea when Representative Longworth, of Ohio, seeing his peril, started after him and rescued him at the risk of his own life.

A Lake That Stores Heat.

There is a lake that stores the sun's heat at Medeve, in northeastern Transylvania. Thick beds of rock salt underlie the district, and a similar formation appears upon the surface in mounds, some of them over 100 feet in height. Among these the lake rests at fully 1,500 feet above sea level. Upon the surface its water is almost sweet, four inches below there is a twentieth of salt, at two feet there is one-fifth, and at five feet the water is practically saturated with salt. In September, after a summer's sunshine, the thermometer showed the lake's waters to be 150 degrees four feet down. Even by April, after a whole season of wintry weather, it had only been reduced to 80 degrees. Experiments have proved that this is due to absorption and retention of the sun's heat by the salt saturated solution.
