

ANOTHER BLIND TIGER RUN TO THE EARTH

Harmon Jones, Alleged Booze Dis-
penser, is Now in Prison.

THOUGHT BOOZE WAS CIDER

Admitted That He Was Selling the
Stuff, but Declared in Court That it
Was for Another Party, and He Bel-
lieved it Cider.

The blind tiger fiend insists upon following his avocation in this county, notwithstanding that he realizes he is facing a hard proposition indeed if he is caught, with chances of being caught nine to ten against him. Deputy Sheriff Beach brought an offender who was arrested for the illegal sale of whiskey from Trenton Monday, and this offender is now in jail awaiting the action of the grand jury.

Deputy Sheriff J. L. Story arrested Herman Jones, a negro, at Rochelle Monday afternoon upon a charge of selling whiskey in a dry county. The man was arraigned in Justice Colman's court Tuesday, and admitted that he sold the beverage, but stated that he was selling same for another party, with the understanding that it was cider. Officer Story captured a ten-gallon keg about half full of a mixture of cheap whiskey and wine, and this was produced in evidence. The defendant also admitted that it was the same "stuff" he had been dispensing to the booze exterminators of Rochelle and vicinity.

After hearing the evidence in the case, several witnesses having testified, Justice Colman held the man under a bond of \$300, in default of which he was remanded to jail.

Sheriff Fennell and his officers are determined to stamp out the blind tiger nuisance as far as possible, and they are succeeding admirably. The county commissioners offer a reward of \$50 for the apprehension and conviction of every offender of the law in this direction, and recently several important "hauls" have been made, four of which were in Newberry.

JUSTICE COLMAN'S COURT.

Two Young Men Arraigned Charged With Interfering With Officer.

Pope & Co., Rochelle, and who stand well in their community, were arraigned before Justice Colman Monday afternoon upon a charge of interfering with an officer in the discharge of his duty and making an assault. Deputy Sheriff L. E. Story was the plaintiff and appeared to testify against the young men, but through their attorney, Evans Haile, they waived examination for their appearance before the grand jury at the fall term of the circuit court and gave bond.

It is said that the young men, when they learned that a warrant was out against them, immediately came to the city and surrendered.


