

Wast Insurance Rate Rescinded.
 New York, August 26.—Sixty-three councils of the Royal Arcanum in this city probably will appoint a delegation to the special convention of the supreme council to be held Aug. 30, at Put-In-Bay, O., to see that the 15 supreme representatives of New York stand by their privileges to vote, for the rescinding of the new rate laws established by the council last May. A call was issued yesterday with the object in view. It asks the local councils to meet in special session, when it is proposed to discuss the matter and if found feasible, the delegation will be appointed.

Carpenters Get Demands.
 Boston, August 26.—Six thousand union carpenters of Boston received an increase of wages under the decision of Judge George T. Wentworth to whom, as special arbitrator, the employers and unionists submitted the question of a new working agreement. Judge Wentworth grants the five main demands of the carpenters, including a wage increase of from 37 1/2 cents an hour to 41 cents, or from \$3 to \$3.25 for an 8-hour day, double time for all over time, instead of time and a half, and an 8-hour instead of a 9-hour work day, for all shop and mill hands.

Female Musical Composer Dead.
 Chicago, August 26.—Word was received by the authorities of the Western university last night that Mrs. Sadie K. Coe, wife of Dr. George A. Coe, who holds the chair of philosophy at the university, died yesterday in a sanatorium at San Francisco after a desperate operation. Mrs. Coe was a well known pianist and composer, and was considered an authority on musical subjects. Her most noted work was a musical setting of Longfellow's "Hiawatha."

Railroad Treasurer Very Ill.
 Jackson, treasurer of the Pennsylvania New York, August 26.—William Railroad company, is critically ill at Allenhurst, N. J., where he arrived last Sunday in the hope that absolute rest by the sea would restore his health. Last night his condition was such as to give small hope for recovery.

Spreckels' Ship Is Seized.
 Washington, August 26.—The state department today received a cablegram from Yokohama saying that the ship Australia, owned by Spreckels, had been seized. The dispatch gives no details of why the ship was seized or anything concerning the business in which it was engaged.

Parents of 23 Children.
 Allentown, Pa., August 26.—Mr. and Mrs. Allen Depp, of Hickory Run, with the appearance of twins yesterday, are the parents of 23 children. The parents are only 40 years and claiming to have the largest family in America. The couple have been married 18 years and have six pairs of twins and are now numbered in the family circle. Depp is employed as a section foreman on a railroad.

Cloudburst Kills Nine People.
 Denver, August 26.—It is reported that a cloudburst at Tabasco, a coal mining camp near Trinidad, Col., has flooded the town and drowned nine persons. Considerable damage to property was caused also. All communication with Trinidad was cut off after the report was sent.

Bar Association Adjourns.
 Narragansett Pier, R. I., August 26.—The delegates to the annual meeting of the American Bar Association held their final sessions here today. The election of officers for the following year was the principal business scheduled. The annual dinner will take place this evening.

CHARTER OF THE LUDWIG TURPENTINE AND TAR COMPANY.

I—The name of this corporation shall be the LUDWIG TURPENTINE AND TAR COMPANY. The principal place of business shall be at Gainesville, Alachua county, Florida.

II—The general nature of the business to be transacted shall be the manufacture and sale of turpentine, tar and chemical products, and the construction and operation of factories, and transportation companies, and the running of commiseraries as shall be necessary for the business of said corporation.

III—The amount of the capital stock authorized by said corporation shall be Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, the number of shares, five hundred (500), par value of each share to be One Hundred Dollars (\$100). Five thousand dollars to be paid in cash and for five thousand dollars in machinery, tools, patents, implements, &c., making fifty thousand dollars paid-up non-assessable stock.
