

FERTILIZER PLANT HAS CHANGED HANDS

Virginia-Carolina Fertilizer Company's New Possession.

FLORIDA FERTILIZER COMPANY

Has Sold Its Fine Plant to Largest and Most Extensive Fertilizer Manufacturing Company in the South—E. E. Cannon Will Continue Manager.

One of the largest and most important deals ever made in this section was consummated Thursday, when A. S. Wooley and George W. Emery of Sanford, Del., owners of the Florida Fertilizer Manufacturing Company, disposed of their interests to the Virginia-Carolina Chemical Company of Richmond, Va.

Messrs. Wooley and Emery will retire from the fertilizer business in Florida. E. E. Cannon, who has been connected with the company in the capacity of manager, will be retained in that position. Mr. Cannon is regarded as one of the most competent fertilizer men in the State.

The plant of the Florida Fertilizer Manufacturing Company is one of the largest and best equipped in Florida, having a capacity of one hundred tons per day. The venture has always been a paying one, and the products of this factory have a reputation from one end of the State to the other.

This immense deal was consummated through F. M. Whittle, Jr., division manager of the Savannah sales department, R. F. Sams, division manager of the Georgia manufacturing department, and Hy Crutcher of Jacksonville, special agent of the Virginia-Carolina Company, who have been in the city working upon the same for several days.

The deal means a great thing for Gainesville, as it has been intimated that the plant would be considerably enlarged and equipped with new and modern machinery and appliances.
