A CLEAN FORTUNE.

Marshall Field of Chicago, who is now prominent in the public eye by reason of his uncomplaining payment of taxes on \$40,000,000 Chicago property, is a close competitor with three others for rank as the richest man in the United States. By common consent John D. Rockefeller heads the list, with Andrew Carnegie second. The next three are H. H. Rogers, William Rockefeller and Marshall Field. with J. P. Morgan, Jacob H. Schiff and J. J. Hill trailing not very far behind. Mr. Field's fortune, which probably approximates \$225,000,000, is the cleanest of all the great American accumnlations. Its possessor has been unifor first a year: \$2.50 six months; \$1.25 three formly fortunate since Potter Palmer, the veteran dry goods king of Chicago, sold his establishment at cost and upon their own terms to his lieutenants, Marshall Field and L. When Leiter died two years ago he was worth \$30,000.000, after having put up \$10,500,000 only three years before that in settlement of the debts of his son. It was to Marshall Field that the late George M. Pullman went with his scheme for the creation of the Pullman Palace Car Company, and it was Field's money that made the enterprise possible. Field and his cronies made great sums out of the Pullman Car Company and are still among heavy shareholders in the big corporation, which has been a mine almost from the beginning. His money aided largely in the development of many of the railroad systems centering in Chicago, and his stock and bond holdings in them are still immense. Throughout this entire period he continued the active management of his dry goods business. His retail store is beyond compare the biggest and best in the United States and his wholesale house is the largest in the West and one of the largest in the

"The fever situation in Pensacola could not possibly be more assuring than it is at present.

"The one new case discovered yesterday is in the same vicinity as are those of the three Greeks previously reported and all are closely quaran-

tined and guarded "The three original cases are convalescent and in a few days should be entirely well. It is evident that these cases were of a mild type and, while it is possible that other cases may follow. the physicians are watching the situation so closely that prompt treatment

will be assured. "The work of screening and fumigating the houses in the quarantined district is being pushed very rapidly and it is hoped that all infected mosquitoes may be destroyed before there is time for them to spread the disease."
