

ANOTHER HOTEL.

Mrs. Richard B. Taylor Will Convert Dormitory into Hostelry.

Gainesville is to have another hotel. Mrs. Richard B. Taylor, for the past year associated with Mrs. Dora Wallace in conducting the Endel Inn, has secured a lease of the East Florida Seminary dormitory, 500 to 506 East Main street N., and will open the same to the public as a hotel at once.

Mrs. Taylor has proven herself a thoroughly competent and popular hostess since she has been connected with the Endel Inn, and since she will now have a more commodious and comfortable building, more conveniently arranged for the purpose, there is no doubt but that she will enjoy a great success. It is her intention to conduct the place upon a strictly first-class basis, catering to the best class of transient and permanent trade.

The dormitory contains thirty rooms, more or less. It is neatly and modernly furnished, and will make a most desirable stopping place for those who, while they prefer hotel to boarding-house accommodations, may enjoy the privilege of a quiet location.

MEETING OF COUNCIL.

Passed Ordinance Empowering Fixing of Water Rates—Other Business.

The City Council held an adjourned meeting Thursday night, at which some unfinished business from the meeting of Monday was disposed of.

The council passed an ordinance granting a right to fix water rate upon the meter system, which was unanimous, and passed to its second and third reading with few amendments.

The resolution of last meeting directing the water committee to make certain improvements and alterations at the waterworks plant, was rescinded, and a resolution was passed to the effect that the water committee be instructed to make necessary excavation to connect pumps as they now stand with the newly discovered source of supply, that the suction be extended to such new source, and that it be demonstrated the practicability of pumping direct from the new source.

After the transaction of minor business the council adjourned.

BUILDING NEW STORES.

AN ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance to Provide for the Fixing of Water Rates and the Collection of Same.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Gainesville, Florida:

Section 1. The Tax Collector of the City of Gainesville is hereby designated and he shall be the person whose duty it is to collect from all persons, firms and corporations using city water, the rent for same. The City Council shall have authority to prescribe and enforce by resolution all necessary rules and regulations governing and controlling the use of city water, the manner in which same may be used and the amount to be charged for the use of same and when payable, and shall by resolution prescribe all rules and regulations of whatsoever kind for the complete control and management of the water supply and the furnishing of same for any and all purposes.

Sec 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect from its passage and approval.
