Alachua County Fair Association.
Exhibits for State Fair.

The Alachua County Fair Association has issued a circular relative to sending an exhibit at the Florida State Fair, which will be read with interest by the people of the county who intend sending exhibits, and who want to see Alachua county's products shown up well at Tampa.

Persons are not asked to give their exhibits to the Fair Association. They are only asked to loan them for exhibition at the Tampa State Fair. If the exhibits are properly tagged they will be safely and be returned to the owner. Tags can be had from the commissioner of your election precinct free of cost. Fill out your address, express and postoffice in a plain hand-writing. Boxes containing exhibits should have the lids fastened with screws to prevent breakage in opening and facilitate repacking.

SHEPARD TO JACKSONVILLE.

Man Arrested Upon Charge of Illicit Distilling Taken Away.

Abraham Shephard, the negro who was arrested by United States officers, assisted by local deputies, near Mikesville, Columbia county, Wednesday, upon a charge of owning and operating an illicit distillery, and who was brought to this city Thursday, was taken to Jacksonville Friday, where he was given a hearing before the United States Commissioner.

This story was fully covered in The Sun of Friday. The officers raided the still, which it is alleged had been in operation for several months, and a quantity of beer and whiskey was secured.

The result of the finding before the commissioner was not learned, but the evidence was of such a nature that it is natural to suppose the prisoner was held to await the action of the Federal grand jury.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Grading Committee for Teachers' Examination Finished Work.

The grading committee appointed for the purpose of examining the papers of applicants for positions as teachers in the schools of Alachua county has made its report.

There were thirty-one white applicants and two colored. Of the whites the received first grade, three second grade and fourteen third grade certificates, nine having failed to come up to the minimum average. Of the colored one passed, securing a second grade certificate while the other failed.

The grading committee comprised Prof. Tom F. McLeath, Prof. W. E. Bell and Mrs. C. C. Powell.
