

**A BIG ROW
ONE MAN KILLED**

Another Was Painfully Wounded
and the Perpetrator Escaped.

SATURDAY NIGHT AFFAIR

Alleged that Negroes Had Gathered
Near Meredith for Regular Weekly
Skin Game—Gamblers Appeared and
Caused a General Rough House.

Information reached this city Monday of a big row which occurred at the negro quarters near Meredith Saturday night, in which one negro, Chas. Jenkins, lost his life, and another negro, name unknown, was seriously shot. The party doing the shooting, the name of whom could not be learned, made his escape, and has not yet been captured.

The particulars are very indefinite, but from the best information it appears that the negroes, as is their custom on Saturday nights, indulged in a skin game. The game progressed until nearly midnight, when a dispute arose, the lamps in the room were extinguished, and a general row ensued with the above result. Jenkins was shot in the arm, the ball passing directly through and entering the heart, from which death resulted almost instantly. The other negro received a painful wound in the right leg, which it is believed will prove serious.

As a rule the negroes of Meredith are a peaceable set, and it is seldom that a row occurs among them, but upon this occasion the disturbance seemed to have originated from the fact that traveling gamblers, who make a profession of living off the earnings of the laboring class of turpentine and sawmill hands, were present, and the men finally realized that they were being "skinned" sure enough, when the trouble began.

Officers are in search of the party who did the shooting, but so far have been unable to apprehend him. He is believed to be hiding in the swamps near Meredith.

JUSTICE COLMAN'S COURT.

Marion Smith, a Young White Man,
Fined on Two Separate Charges.

Marion Smith, a young white man employed by C. C. Pedrick, was arraigned before Justice Colman yesterday upon two charges—that of carrying concealed weapons and discharging a firearm. It appears that young Smith's father gave him a pistol that he had been repairing Sunday morning and requested him to walk out into the woods and try the weapon to ascertain if it was all right. In obedience to this command Mr. Smith, with a group of companions, went to a point near Berens' Arm, when he discharged the piece several times. Sheriff Fenwick happened to be in the vicinity and was attracted by the shots. He placed young Smith under arrest upon the charges stated.

The defendant was fined \$2.50 and costs for shooting on the Sabbath and \$10.00 and costs for carrying a concealed weapon. The fine in the last instance, however, was suspended pending good behavior.

Mr. Smith stated that he had no intention of offending the law, but was simply obeying the will of his father. He has a way-borne good reputation.

Death of Good Man.

Friends of T. J. McRae of Hawthorn will sympathize with him in the recent death of his father, Judge M. N. McRae, who died at his residence in Lumber City, Georgia.

McRae had lived four score and one being eighty-seven years of age at the time of his demise. During his life he was engaged in the Confederate service, being in charge of the quartermaster's department. He was a member of the Georgia State Militia and a district in the Constitutional Convention of Georgia in 1876.

He was a fifty-five years a member of the Methodist church, and up to a few years ago was an earnest and faithful member of the church.

At New Orleans.

New Orleans, September 18.—From 6 p. m. yesterday until noon today 11 new cases and no deaths. Total cases 2,582, and total deaths 335. It is thought that by October 15th the disease will be stamped out.
