JUSTICE COLMAN'S COURT.

Dr. Davis Placed Under Bond for Appearance at Circuit Court.

There was an interesting session of Justice Colman's court Thursday morning, the arraignment of Dr. G. N. Davis upon a charge of obtaining money under false pretense, made by Mrs. W. D. Smith, having come up.

The little court-room was crowded, as it was a case which had been thoroughly advertised, and the result was a great many curious spectators were there.

The specifications of this charge have already been published. The amount involved was \$25, which the plaintiff stated on the stand she gave to the defendant in some land deal.

Four witnesses testified, being the plaintiff, Mrs. W. D. Smith, her husband, and the defendant and Attorney G. H. Scofield, who also represented the defendant.

Justice Colman placed the defendant under a bond of \$105 for his appearance at the fall term of the circuit court, which was promptly given, and he was released.

New Orleans, September 21.—From 6 p. m. Tuesday to 6 p. m. Wednesday there were 50 new cases and 6 deaths. From 6 p. m. last night to noon today there were 20 cases and three deaths. The conditions, however, are constantly improving, notwithstanding the occasional jumps in number of cases.
