J. W. Montgomery has been arrested at Jacksonville for embezzling \$350 from a colored Knights of Pythias lodge.

THE YELLOW FEVER.

No Deaths at Pensacola—Heavy Rain at New Orleans.

Pensacola, Sept. 27.—The people are feeling somewhat better over the fever outlook. From 6 p. m. yesterday until noon today there were only three new cases. From 6 p. m. Monday until 6 p. m. yesterday there were eight new cases and two deaths. Total number of cases to date, 112; total deaths, 14.

At New Orleans.

New Orleans, Sept. 27.—From 6 p. m. yesterday to noon today there were 14 new cases and five deaths. For 24 hours up to 6 p. m. Tuesday there were 31 new cases and five deaths. Total cases to date are 2,013, and total deaths, 877. The heaviest rain for several weeks has wrought much injury to the work of checking the fever.

FREE TRAINING FOR NURSES.

Young Women of Small Towns and Country Districts to be Favored.

By the terms of a fund to be administered in connection with the Philadelphia School for Nurses, Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, a number of young women from every county will receive free training in nursing. It is planned to ultimately reach and help in this way every township and village.

The young women will be provided with room, board, nurse uniforms and all the refinements of a well-appointed Christian home. At graduation the diploma of the School and the Order of the Red Cross will be conferred, qualifying for practice in any State or county; the railroad fare will then be paid back home.

Those applying and chosen to receive the benefits of this fund will be given two years' training, with a rich experience in nursing the sick poor of the city under skilled leaders. The term may be shortened to eighteen months by taking a preliminary course of six months' reading and study at home. A special short course enables young women to quickly qualify themselves for self-support and a substantial income.

In addition to regular nursing, the young women are taught how to preserve their own health; how to recognize, avoid and destroy contagion; how to establish and maintain perfect sanitary conditions about the home; they are prepared for positions as office nurse and physician's assistant; they get a practical knowledge of city mission movements, deaconess training, college settlement work, and are also trained for special positions of trust in institutions.

The School is ten years old and is endorsed by physicians, leading educators and prominent men throughout the country.

Schedule is Bad.

F. M. Ramsey of Wacahoota was in the city yesterday. Mr. Ramsey states that the discontinuing of the train over the Gainesville and Gulf Railway south of here, which arrived in Gainesville in the morning and returned in the afternoon, would work a great inconvenience on the part of the people of that section who have become accustomed to coming to Gainesville to do their trading. With the present schedule it is impossible to make a round trip in one day. Superintendent Barker of the Gainesville and Gulf states that this arrangement is only temporary, however, and that the train will be put on again in a short time.

PUTNAM COUNTY "WET."

The Election in That County Tuesday Went Against Local Option.

According to a report in The Jacksonville Metropolis of Wednesday evening, the vote on local option in Putnam county on Tuesday was carried in favor of license by a majority of 85. Both sides put up a strong fight and the city was carried for saloons by 195 votes. It is stated that several places that were counted on for large majorities in favor of local option were very close.

Suffering from Hallucinations.

New York, Sept. 27.—The police and a physician today decided that Christine Grossman, the 11-year-old girl, who was found unconscious from alleged robbers' attack in her home yesterday, was suffering only mental hallucinations. Near the place where she was found a search revealed a demand for \$900 written on the back of her mother's picture which was hung with its face to the wall. A demand for \$200 was written on the back of her own picture. The police comparing the handwriting on these pictures to that which were in Christine's school copy book, declared that the girl herself had written the demands.

Charged with Killing Sister.

Richmond, Va., Sept. 27.—Jimmie Epps, an 8-year-old boy and his mother have been arrested and lodged in jail at Williamsburg, Va., charged with the killing of the boy's 6-year-old sister, Matilda, who died recently. The boy is said to have beaten his sister with a brick, but insists that he acted at the instigation of his mother, who, he says, also beat the child. The body of the dead child was exhumed and it showed a number of injuries, one of which alone, a fracture of the skull, was declared by physicians to have been sufficient to cause death.

Life Savers Rescue Crew.

Graham, Mass., Sept. 27.—An unknown three-masted schooner, loaded, is ashore on Pollock rip and is in danger of being broken to pieces. The crew of the Monomoy life saving station discovered the vessel at daylight. The life savers succeeded in boarding the schooner after a hard pull through a choppy sea. A strong north wind is blowing and the crew of the schooner and the life savers will have a difficult task in returning to shore.

No New Cases of Cholera.

Berlin, Sept. 26.—8:34 p. m.—The official bulletin issued today announced that no new cases of cholera nor no deaths from cholera had been reported from noon yesterday to noon today, thus leaving the totals unchanged. The new cases reported by newspaper correspondents at Bromberg and Marienwerder appear to have been previously reported officially.


Operation for Nasal Difficulty.
