

DISCOVERS VINELESS POTATOES

Montana Man Places on Exhibit This Wonderful Product.
Great Falls, Mont., Sept. 27.—At the county fair, which opened here yesterday, there is one exhibition which the visitor says, is vineless potatoes.
Some three months ago C. D. Darst, discoverer of the new process for producing potatoes, announced that he could grow potatoes in from two to three months, in a special preparation discovered by himself, in layers on top of each other and without vines. His experiments have been conducted in a box 8 feet square. In the bottom of this box a layer of Darst's preparation is placed to the depth of 3 inches, and a number of potatoes are planted therein. Another layer of 3 inches is scattered over these potatoes and more potatoes planted in the usual way and so on until the frame is filled.
Darst claims that the box may be built to almost any height with layer after layer of potatoes without affecting the producing quality of composition, and that he can have new potatoes for market in any climate at any time of the year.

MYSTERIOUS MURDER IN LONDON

Body of Young Woman Is Found by the Authorities Badly Mutilated.

London, Sept. 27.—The Mostham tunnel of the London and Southeastern railway where the brutal murder of Frederick I. Goldby Percy Lefroy, alias Mapleton, occurred June 27, 1881, again has been the scene of a mysterious tragedy, the details of which so far as ascertained are markedly similar to that of a quarter of a century ago.

In the present case the victim is a young woman, Mary Money, whose body was horribly mutilated. A long veil was tightly wedged in her mouth and the police are confident that the woman was murdered in the compartment of a train on which she was traveling and that her body was thrown from the doors of the train on its arrival at Redhill was open is considered to prove conclusively that it was not a case of suicide.

Miss Money left her home on Sunday evening saying she would not be gone long.
