The Dade county court has such a push of business on hand that night sessions are being held.

The Circulo Cubans of Tampa, an organization of Cubans for social intercourse, will erect a fine building in that city.

The Methodist church at Jasper will have \$1,200 in improvements, which will add much to its inside and outside appearance.

Charged with Blackmail.
Dublin, Ga., Oct. 20.—C. McHunn and wife were carried from Dublin to Perry to answer to the charge of blackmail. They are said to have blackmailed a young lawyer of Perry out of his watch and chain and a check for \$1,000. Payment on the check was refused at the bank. McHunn claims to be an osteopathic doctor, but has been selling maps in Dublin. He claims that his offices are on Poplar street in Macon. As far as known he and his wife did not try any blackmailing scheme while in Dublin. Their personal effects are in the hands of the officers for an unpaid board bill at a local lodging house for \$32. McHunn is said to be a native of Powersville, Ga., and is well connected.

Accidentally Kills Self.
Atlanta, Oct. 20.—As the result of the accidental discharge of a gun early Thursday, Thomas Richard Rustin, 17 years old, of Lakewood Heights, died almost instantly. Young Rustin was shot in the presence of his mother and father, and the rest of the family. A load of No. 7 shot from the double-barreled gun struck him behind the right ear, blowing out his brains. Despite the efforts of Dr. Monroe Smith, he died at 9 o'clock, two hours and a half after he was shot. Rustin was assistant cashier for the Davison-Paxon Dry Goods Co., and was well thought of by the firm. Surviving him are his mother, his father, J. T. Rustin, and four younger brothers.

Alabamian Charged with Bigamy.
Huntsville, Ala., Oct. 20.—C. W. Kirby, a salesman employed by a furniture house in this city, has been arrested on a charge of bigamy, preferred by a woman from Jackson county, who claims to be his first wife. The woman from Jackson claims that Kirby married her several years ago, and went to Tennessee, where he married against without obtaining a divorce from her. She recently moved from Jackson county to this city with her children to seek employment. She had heard nothing of her absent husband until she met and recognized him on the street in Huntsville.

Francis Is Found Guilty.
Philadelphia, Oct. 20.—Stanley Francis, who has been on trial in the United States district court since October 1, charged with using the mails to defraud in connection with the defunct Storey Cotton company, was today found guilty on every count in the indictment. Francis, who was known under several aliases, was charged by the government with being a principal in the Storey Cotton company, which, when closed by the postal authorities, owed \$2,926,578 to "customers" throughout the country. Application was made for a new trial.

Wichita, Kan., Oct. 20.—The condition of ex-Congressman Jerry Simpson was improved early today, the patient having slept the greater part of the night. The attending physician, however, held out no hope and says that death is liable to occur at any time.

Negro Kills Motorman.
Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 20.—No greater indignation has ever been felt in Birmingham for murder than that said to have been done by a negro, which cost the life of Barry Pessner, a motorman, at the hands of R. L. Nix, a desperate negro, on Tuesday night. The negro, some time ago, drew a knife and cut L. Tennerson, a merchant, during a quarrel over a petty transaction in the latter's store. The motorman had been enduring the cursing of a gang of negro men on the front platform of a Gate City car, until he could stand it no longer and informed the negroes that they must desist or leave the car. This infuriated Nix, who drew a knife and saying "Damn you, put me off," stabbed Pessner in the breast and neck. Pessner died the next morning. The negro ran, but was captured a few blocks from the scene of the crime. When he was taken to the county jail a great crowd followed and would have done violence if permitted.

Merger Is Endorsed.
Cincinnati, Oct. 20.—The members of the administrative council of the National Metal Trades association have endorsed every detail of the merger of their organization with the National Founders' association, and last adjourned after empowering the committee, which has had charge of the preliminary details, to bring the merger to an actuality. The new body will retain the name of the national metal trades association. The present officers are President J. W. Gardner, of Quincy, Ill.; First Vice President Fred A. Gier, of Cincinnati; Second Vice President W. D. Salle, of Cleveland, O. and Treasurer W. E. Copeland, of Chicago.
