After January 2, 1906, the carpenters of West Palm Beach will demand an 8-hour day.

The Presbyterian church at Eustis has been greatly improved in the interior appearance.

The farmers around High Springs and other places are holding their corn for better prices.

The East Coast Cattle Company will have headquarters at Fort Pierce, and so have a capital of \$60,000.

The hyacinths are obstructing the East Line Canal so that launches have difficulty in passing through the water.

H. Decker & Bro. of Clermont will open up a dry goods and gents' furnishing store at Eustis, making that city their home.

Mrs. L. B. Mather, teacher of the Turkey Creek school, has resigned. She had too much trouble with the school board.

A slight blaze in the kitchen roof of the University buildings at Lake City, Sunday, caused a lot of excitement but not much damage.

John Smith, who claims Jacksonville as his home, is under arrest in Atlanta for robbing a man of \$45. John Smith used to live in Cincinnati.

The Seventh Day Adventists have just closed an interesting conference meeting at Plant City. The church is increasing in strength in the State.

M. A. Brown still holds the office of sheriff of Duval county, and quo warranto proceedings are said to be the only method of contesting the law.

TAX RETURNS ARE TOO LOW.

State Examiner Discovers that Property Returns Are Too Small.

Montgomery, Ala., Oct. 24.—State Examiner of Public Accounts finds that the property of Shelby county is given in at about half its real value to the tax officers. It is shown that there is an increase in valuations in 1905 over last year of \$199,252. The valuations in 1904 were \$4,575,974.

These facts were brought out by an examination of the books of the officers of the county, just finished by Mr. Gorman. It is found that Judge of Probate A. P. Longshore had made a mistake against the state of \$36.35, and Tax Collector J. H. Robertson \$10, both of which amounts were remitted at once. The other officers whose books were examined were Tax Assessor J. H. Pitts, Superintendent of Education J. O. Dorough, Sheriff R. F. Cox, Clerk J. R. Lyke, ex-Clerk J. P. Pearson.

Shelby is one of the best counties in the state, having several lines of railroad, valued in 1904, at \$1,941,261, with other public utility valuations as follows: Telegraph lines, \$74,722; telegraph, \$44,923. Besides this it has \$196,310 in water company values.

With all these and a number of furnaces and other iron works, it is seen that the lands are given at a very low figure, especially as they are in many cases underlaid with valuable minerals.

Woman Charged with Pickpocketing.

Atlanta, Oct. 24.—After shadowing the "woman in black" who was believed to be the female pickpocket, and the leader of the gang which robbed a number of people in the city last Friday. Detectives Simpson and Lanford and Patrolman Roberts arrested, in the Kimball house, yesterday Mrs. Henry C. White, and placed her in the female detention ward at the police barracks. At the same time they arrested a young man who gave his name as Charles Gray. When searched, Mrs. White was found to have \$244 aid on her clothing, done up in five packages, and the officers believe this is a part of the money which they made so many rich hauls while the president was in Atlanta.

British Officers Rescued.

Tangiers, Oct. 24.—The scout ship Patinister has arrived herewith Captain Crowther and Lieutenant Hatton, the British officers who were captured by Moroccan tribesmen, on board. This liberation of the officers was effected through the good offices of the sheriff of Wazzan, and in exchange for the brigand, Valiente, a brother of whom headed the Anjera tribesmen, who made the capture. In an interview, the sheriff said that there was no difficulty in effecting the exchange of prisoners and that no ransom was asked or other conditions imposed. The officers said they were well treated by their captors.

GOVERNOR'S MANSION BURNS.

Missouri's Executive and Family Have Narrow Escape from Flames. Jefferson City, Mo., Oct. 24.—The governor's Mansion at Jefferson City was damaged to the extent of \$10,000 by fire this morning at 3 o'clock. Governor Folk, his wife and guests had to seek quarters at a nearby hotel.

Governor Folk, who was aroused by the crackling of the flames, telephoned to the fire department and then attempted to extinguish the fire, burning in the second story hallway, with two fire extinguishers. This proved ineffective, and after seeing his wife and their five guests were safely out of the mansion, the governor devoted himself to saving the portraits of his predecessors in office, pending the arrival of the firemen. The fire is believed to have started from a flue in the hallway. After more than an hour's labor, the fire was extinguished.

The mansion was erected in 1872 at a cost of \$75,000. Since then frequent appropriations have been made by the legislature and the improvements and furnishings have cost \$75,000 more. The loss is fully covered by insurance.

Genesis of the Lightning Rod.

The first lightning rod was not constructed by Franklin nor set up in America, but by a monk at Seutenberg, Bohemia, named Protop Divilsch. His apparatus was made and put together during the spring and summer of the year 1754 and was first set up in the garden of the cure of Prenditz (Moravia) on June 15 of the year above named. The rod attained as much distinction as that later made by Franklin and was the cause of the inventor being presented with much money and large estates. His enemies claimed that the rod was the cause of the great drought of 1757, 1758 and 1759, and upon the matter being reported to Vienna it was ordered to be taken down.
