

**SOUTHERN BELL  
AGAIN IN CHECK**

Seaboard Endeavors to Prevent Them From Crossing Tracks.

CLAIM THAT IT IS HAZARDOUS

To Lives of Passengers, and Also to Traffic—An Interesting Injunction Suit Which Will be Watched by the Florida Bar.

The Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, who for the past few months have been endeavoring to construct a long distance telephone line connecting Gainesville and Jacksonville, and through Jacksonville the outside world, seems to be meeting with a great many disadvantages. At the beginning those entrusted to the duty of securing a right-of-way were slow; the contractors delayed the work for some time on account of failure to deliver poles, and other obstacles have been placed in way of the work, notwithstanding that the Southern Bell Company have been anxious to push the same.

But the latest obstruction comes from Starke, and is in the nature of a bill of injunction prohibiting the crossing of the tracks of the Seaboard Air Line at that place. Starke is the first point at which it has become necessary for the wires of the Southern Bell to cross the tracks of the Seaboard, and that great corporation, through its attorney, has caused to be issued from the judge of the Eighth Judicial Circuit a writ of injunction, upon the grounds that the crossing of the wires of the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company may interfere with traffic, and may endanger the lives of passengers on said road.

The outcome of this injunction will be awaited with considerable interest by those interested, and the members of the profession throughout the State. Attorneys for the Southern Bell cannot understand the attitude taken by the Seaboard at this particular point, since they declare that no objection has ever been made in similar cases elsewhere.

Attorney J. E. Fatch of Starke is pressing the case for the Seaboard, while Attorney Evans Haile of this city represents the Southern Bell.


