Pensacola Sees the End—New Orleans Continues to Gain.

Pensacola, Oct. 25.—Four new cases and no deaths today, which makes the total number of cases 500 and the total number of deaths 68. There are now under treatment 69 cases.

The record yesterday was nine new cases and one death. The authorities continue cheerful, and insist that the end is in sight.

At New Orleans.

New Orleans, Oct. 25.—One new case and no deaths was the record up to noon today. Yesterday there were four new cases and two deaths. Total deaths to date, 448.
