Strobhar, Who Had Foot Amputated in Serious Condition.

Strobhar, the young flagman of the Springs-Rochelle freight line, had the misfortune about a week ago to get his right foot crushed by car wheels at High Street, who was afterwards operated on and taken to the railway hospital at Waycross, in a critical condition. The amputation operation was first performed at Waycross, where the accident occurred, in the attempt to save as much of the foot as possible but the surgeons did not take off quite enough, with the result that blood got set in, and it became necessary to make a second amputation. It is now that young Strobhar is in a serious condition, and that he will not survive the last operation. His friends here hope that he will be able to get out of this trying condition, and will soon be out again. Strobhar is the son of J. N. Strobhar, former agent at this point on the Atlantic Coast Line. His father is now residing in Canada.

NEGRO ASSAILANT CAPTURED.

Black Brute Who Assaulted Mrs. Moore is Apprehended.

Atlanta, Oct. 31.—The posse which has been chasing the negro who assaulted Mrs. Alice Moore last Thursday, caught him in a swamp not far from the Hempnill waterworks pumping station at 11:30 o'clock this morning.

The negro under arrest is believed beyond a doubt to be the black fellow for whom hundreds of men have been searching since the crime.

The negro spent Sunday night at the house of another negro near the Miller stock yards.

Early Monday morning he applied to the stock yards for work. The man to whom he applied, believing he was the negro wanted, gave him employment and immediately communicated with the police.

The negro at whose house he spent Sunday night heard that the police had been telephoned for and notified the suspect, who at once ran away.

In this flight he dropped a belt he had been wearing.

This belt was picked up by one of the posse in pursuit and was found to tally with the description given of the belt by the assailant by Mrs. Moore.
