The Ocala hardwood mill will be located at Brooksville.

Perry is shy on houses for people who are rushing to that town.

The winter hotels at West Palm Beach are opening up for trade.

Jacksonville will be quite swell with its ten-story sky-scraper, soon to be built.

St. Augustine will make an effort to have a military post established at Fort Marion.

The shipment of Peace River phosphate rock through the port of Punta Gorda thus far this year aggregates 57,315 tons.

There has been over one hundred thousand dollars' worth of real estate changing hands in Hernando county in the last 30 days.

Fourteen cars of steel rails passed through Jacksonville on Wednesday en route to Homestead for the East Coast extension.

Tampa has a three-cornered fight on for the position of postmaster in that city. The time of Postmaster Reynolds expires January, 1906.

The females employed in a Ybor City cigar factory indulged in a cussing bee, and the courts were called on to tell which used the choicest Spanish.

The new board of aldermen of Key West is trying to help the citizens pay their taxes, and an ordinance is arranged so that those prior to 1903 can be paid in scrip.

At the meeting of the Palatka Woman's Club a "concentrated" poem was sprung on those present. The poem had been put up in a tin can and was just as good as the day it was "done up."

The Florida Biscuit and Candy Company is the name of a new industry to be started in Tampa. Fancy cakes, candies, crackers and breads will be their products, and the business will be a wholesale trade.

The annual reunion of the Florida Division, United Confederate Veterans, will be held in Jacksonville on December 13-14 under the auspices of R. E. Lee Camp No. 58, U. C. V., assisted by Martha Reid Chapter, U. D. C., Stonewall Jackson Camp, U. S. C. V., and the Jacksonville Board of Trade.

No special day at the State Fair to be held in Tampa, November 15th to 30th, will be more memorable than Press Day, designated in honor of the newspaper men of Florida who have done so much to make the Fair a grand success. A banquet to newspaper men and legislators will be among the features.

The News is glad to report that the Japanese colony at Boca Ratone is progressing nicely and is in a most prosperous condition. Several weeks ago some of the members of the colony became dissatisfied and left, but those who remained expressed themselves as being perfectly satisfied with the conditions. The colony cleared over \$3,000 on tomatoes last season and is making progress in many other ways.—Miami News.

Brobston & Fendig of Jacksonville on Thursday closed a deal with Goethe Bros., the well-known sawmill men of Summerfield, by which 25,000 acres of good timber land near Withlacoochee was transferred. The consideration involved is said to have been between \$30,000 and \$75,000. The same firm has also sold to Winkle Brothers, the Georgia sawmill men, some \$50,000 worth of land in Pasco county, near San Antonio.

WOMAN DISGUISED AS MAN.

Travels Across the Continent as a Tramp Before Identity Discovered.

New York, Nov. 3.—A three months' journey across the continent from Nevada, during which she was attired in men's clothes, Mrs. Margaret Jenkins arrived here Tuesday, says a dispatch to the Herald from Wilkesbarre, Pa.

She was making her way by stealing rides on freight trains and was bound for Lewiston, Pa., where she has relatives. A Lehigh Valley railroad special officer saw her in a car and arrested her. Not until she was taken to the station house did she reveal the fact that she was a woman, and then she told a story so pathetic that she was released.

She said that eight years ago she and her husband left Scranton for Nevada, where they lived happily until three months ago, when he deserted her. Too proud to remain in the town where she was known, but penniless and without friends to whom she could appeal, she decided to make her way east.

Finding that as a woman even food was refused her and that work was impossible to obtain, she procured men's clothing, cut off her hair and resumed her journey eastward. Her sex was never discovered nor was she arrested until she reached here.

NEWS TERSELY TOLD.

The Sanborn bank at Sanborn, Ind., was robbed of \$40,000 by burglars last night.

The Columbia box factory at Nineteenth and North Market street, St. Louis, was destroyed by fire early today. The loss is estimated at \$175,000.

Mrs. Della George, probably the oldest resident in the state of New York, died at Lancaster yesterday at the age of 108. Her husband served in the war of 1812.

It is reported that Baron Komura, the Japanese foreign minister, accompanied by H. W. Denison, the foreign adviser of the Japanese government, will go to Peking as special envoy of Japan.

It is officially announced at Paris that the remainder of the battleships to be built under the naval program will have a displacement equal to the displacement of the large battleships of the other naval powers.

An attempt was made early today to rob the Deposit Bank of Sulphur, Ky. The thieves were frightened away by the arrival of citizens attracted by the explosion. The vault was badly damaged and experts will be called to open it.

In the circuit court at St. Louis Judge Reynolds yesterday sentenced Patrick Cummings to two years in the penitentiary on conviction of false registration. This is the first conviction under the false registration act. Cummings will ask for a new trial.

M. Takashi, the financial agent of Japan, answering an inquiry regarding the report that a Japanese loan of \$300,000,000 would be issued at London, today informed the Associated Press yesterday that nothing has been yet decided in regard to issuing a new loan.

Large Fruit Crop in California.

Ventura, Calif., Nov. 3.—The citrus fruit crop promises to be from 10 to 15 per cent greater than last year in this county, and the price also promises to be better, especially on oranges. This year the orange crop in the Ojai will reach 75,000 boxes. Santa Paula will grow 125 carloads. The Fillmore section will have 300 cars and Piru and Camulos 25 cars. Of the lemons, there will be 350 cars from Santa Paula and Limonera and 600 cars from Fillmore. Last year the Limonera, here the biggest lemon orchard in the world is located, shipped 265 cars. Many new orange and lemon orchards have been put out during the past season.
