

REV. SAM SMALL'S UNIQUE LECTURE

Delivered at the Opera House on
Last Sunday Evening.

"HIS MAJESTY, THE DEVIL."

A Brilliant and Forceful Account of the
Methods Employed by His Majesty.
A Large and Attentive Audience Was
Present—Frequent Applause.

From Tuesday's Daily Sun.
The audience at the opera house on
Sunday evening to hear Rev. Sam
Small's famous lecture on "His Majesty,
The Devil," overflowed the house
capacity and filled the adjacent hall-
way. It was a cultured and expect-
ant assemblage, and that it enjoyed
the unique discourse of the noted
evangelist and orator was testified by
frequent applause.

The speaker was introduced by Rev.
T. J. Nixon of Kavanagh Methodist
Church, and entered at once upon his
discourse. It is a production that
shows the large research and the ex-
tended human experiences of the lec-
turer.

Mr. Small believes in a real Devil—
a Great fallen angel of spiritual nature
and powers—who is active in malig-
nant labor for the debauchment of hu-
manity. His delineation of how the
Devil came to being and how he oper-
ates to obtain psychic power over hu-
man spirits for evil purposes is a
thrilling and convincing recital. His
analysis of the philosophy and proces-
ses of Satan is an exposition of scrip-
tural truths that is wonderfully inter-
esting and has charmed and informed
hundreds of thousands of people all
over this country.

Mr. Small is a majestic speaker,
with a humor either delicate or broad,
as the occasion requires, and many of
his most salient views are enforced by
witticisms that are chaste and apropos.
Those who heard the lecture were
delighted beyond measure and sorry
that the seventy minutes of the ad-
dress were such short ones.

Mr. Small spoke again last evening
at Kavanagh Methodist Church, and
will be heard there again tonight at
7:30 o'clock on "The Three Cardinal
Sins."

LECTURE ON MARTIN LUTHER.

Delivered by Rev. F. A. Holtzhausen at
the Presbyterian Church.

The lecture on "Dr. Martin Luther,
the Hero of Heroes," delivered at the
First Presbyterian Church last Sunday
evening by the Rev. F. A. Holtzhausen,
was attentively listened to by a large
congregation.

Mr. Holtzhausen believes that there
is great need in our times of the Gos-
pel as interpreted and illustrated by
reformation history. He considers the
great religious revival of the sixteenth
century one of three great epochs of
the Church, ranking it with Israel's de-
liverance from Egyptian bondage and
the advent of Jesus Christ. We can
rightly understand and appreciate the
blessings, opportunities and institu-
tions of the modern world only by
knowing the issues raised and settled
by the reformation.

Martin Luther was set forth as the
chief embodiment and foremost cham-
pion of this great movement. After
mentioning the facts of the reformer's
childhood and youth, of his conver-
sion, deep religious experience and en-
trance into the priesthood, the lectur-
er led his audience into Luther's great
work.

Beginning with the posting of the
thesis against indulgences and contin-
uing in the description of Luther's
controversies, his bold act of defiance
of the dreaded power of ex-communi-
cation in the public burning of the
papal bull; of his conflicts with the ec-
clesiastical and civil authorities, he
showed how the great principles of jus-
tification by faith of the sole authority
of the Bible in all religious matters
and of the liberty of conscience from
all human domination were establish-
ed. And the lecture concluded with an
appeal to hold fast and work out more
fully the blessings of the reformation.

Mr. Holtzhausen is full of inspira-
tion in his theme and speaks with all
the conviction and earnestness of man
who believes that he has a message
from God to deliver to his fellow-men.


