Brief Happenings From Various Sections of State.

Many of the orange groves around Orlando are nearly through with picking.

During the year 1905 the Pensacola police made 3,809 arrests—2,065 whites and 1,824 blacks.

The Stockman, published at DeFuniak Springs, advocates poultry raising for Florida farmers.

The Order of Eagles organized in Pensacola Monday night, with a little over one hundred members to start with.

The stockholders of the State Bank at Lakeland have elected Charles H. Robinson as president and E. O. Flood cashier.

The St. Petersburg fair is now on in full blast, and it is said to have a fine display of all kinds of fruits grown in that section.

The Duval county bloodhounds recently purchased in Kentucky have arrived. Pity they could not have been on hand sooner.

Lakeland is after the county seat of Polk, but Bartow will make strong resistance. They may split the county if they pull too hard.

Dr. Wharton of Baltimore, Md., is conducting a spirited revival at the Baptist church in Live Oak. The other churches are co-operating.

The next meeting of the State Baptist Association will be held at Live Oak, and the people of that city will give them a royal welcome.

D. A. Flawrence of Titusville has refused \$15,000 for the crop of grapefruit on his grove at Alva. The crop is estimated at about 8,000 boxes. It is only a four-year-old grove.

The Sea Island cotton crop in Madison county is said to be a big one and the gins have much more work to do. Upland cotton will be planted more extensively in the future, owing to low prices.

Sam Sing, a Chinese laundryman of Jacksonville, was robbed of \$25 on Saturday night by two black men who entered the laundry and elbowed the celestial over the head with a revolver and then escaped.

Two negro women got into a row on the street near the Cummer mill settlement Sunday night, when one drew a revolver and opened fire. She did not hit her antagonist, but shot John Griffin in the back and wounded two other negroes who were sitting on a porch close by.

Port Inglis leads the list of ports from which Florida hard rock was exported in 1905. The shipments for last year of that mineral from all ports totaled 570,846 tons, distributed as follows: Port Inglis, 185,211; Savannah, 180,219; Fernandina, 115,837; Port Tampa, 65,767; Brunswick, 23,812.

In a family quarrel Saturday night Noah Bird shot and killed Josh Mizell at the home of the latter about three miles from Orlando. Mizell's wife is Bird's sister. He was in a bad humor with her and Bird interfered, when, he claims, Mizell drew his knife and started for him, whereupon Bird shot, killing him instantly. Both men have been residents of that section all their lives.

Charles Hamilton, the aeronaut, gave an exhibition with his aeroplane at Ormond-Daytona Beach Sunday afternoon which nearly cost him his life. The aeroplane was being towed by an automobile and when it had reached a height of 250 feet commenced to dive and pitch until it came to the earth with a crash. Hamilton escaped with

Fourteen Negroes Bruised.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 23.—In a wreck 6 miles out from this place, two cars, baggage and second-class coach of the Western of Alabama railway, were overturned. Fourteen negroes in the coach were bruised, but only three were specially hurt, one having a broken arm, another a dislocated shoulder and the other a cut on the leg. It is thought the switch was tampered with, and an accident of like kind happened there a few weeks ago. The track was cleared in two hours.

Falmouth, England, Jan. 23.—The Danish steamer St. Domingo, Captain Koch, from Galveston via St. Thomas, bound to Copenhagen, has arrived here towing the British steamer Petunia, for Bordeaux, from Wilmington, N. C., and Darton, which she picked up at sea with the loss of her propeller.

Two Killed in Collision.
Mexico City, Jan. 23.—Two men, a locomotive engineer and express messenger, were killed outright in a collision between a passenger and a freight train on the Inter-Oceanic railway. Two others were severely injured. The baggage car contained half a million silver dollars for exportation, but none were lost.

Injunction Suits Postponed.
San Francisco, Jan. 23.—The two injunction suits in the fight for a better terminus by the Western Pacific which was to have come up for hearing before United States Judge Morrow Monday has been postponed for a week, and it is rumored that negotiations are pending between the Southern Pacific and Western Pacific for a compromise.
