Jacksonville is making an effort to organize another light artillery company in that city.

Williston is to have a town hall and a bank, and there are improvements in store for this thriving little burg.

Every fruit grower in Florida should attend the meeting of the State Horticultural Society at Jacksonville, May 1st to 4th.

The Methodist Cuban mission building, to be erected at Ybor City, will cost \$3,568 and will be constructed of artificial stone.

Avon Park prides itself on having one of the best equipped country schools in the State, and there are a great many good ones.

John Williams, a colored man of Jacksonville, with several aliases, got four years for stealing three chickens. Poultry comes high in that city.

The Suwannee county cotton growers are in earnest to keep up their association, and the meetings are well attended. There will be one held May 18th.

O. C. Parker of Tallahassee has the contract for the Governor's mansion. He is a Tallahassee contractor and the price is \$23,492, being the lowest of four bidders.

The people of Tampa must have their sisters screened to keep out the pesky mosquitoes or they will have to pay the fiddler. Tampa will take no chances on yellow fever.

The people of Pensacola and vicinity want a game warden appointed for that section, to protect the indiscriminate slaughter of game and fish. Every county should have one.

The city hall at Tampa does not present a very fine appearance, according to The Tribune of that city, which says it looks like a cross between a shambles and a "joint," after a night's "rough house."

Congressman Joseph C. Sibley of Pennsylvania, who is now in Tampa, announces that at the completion of his present term he will retire to private life and make his home in St. Petersburg, where he has recently invested a large sum of money.

The negro Charley Walker, alias Curley, who killed two and wounded seven men at Nassauville on November 11, 1905, was on Tuesday afternoon found guilty of murder in the first degree at Fernandina, and sentenced to be hanged. The jury was out nearly 15 minutes.

Three suits of \$25,000 each have been filed in the United States court at Pensacola against the Adcock Lumber Company of Allie, Fla., by John Bryant, Neeta Robinson and Narcissus Calhoun. The complaints in the cases allege the personal injury of near relatives by reason of the negligence of the company or its agents. The cases will probably be heard at the May term of court.

George Garry, cashier of the Tampa Electric Company, was drowned in Tampa Bay, Tuesday morning. He was out in a canoe with a party, when the wind sprang up and the canoe was capsized. Misses Mamie Reynolds and Saeie Stevens and Mr. T. J. Mahoney were the other occupants of the craft, but were saved through the efforts of Mr. Mahoney. Garry had been rowing and was quite exhausted when the boat capsized.

Charged with Pension Frauds. Clyde, O., April 19.—Two United States deputy marshals have arrested Captain John T. Aldrich, pension attorney; Mrs. Emily Crane, Eugene M. Aldrich, a notary, and son of Captain Aldrich; H. G. Gibbs, a real estate dealer, and prominent in politics; B. F. Rogers, justice of the peace, and Jesse H. Lang, a notary of Oberlin, O., who is over 80 years of age. It is declared that wholesale pension frauds have been discovered.

Boy Gets Life Term. Cleveland, O., April 19.—A life sentence in the pen awaits George Loestner, aged 21, one of the three boy burglars charged with robbing the house of Herman Jacoby. The jury in Judge Beacom's Court found him guilty, and did not recommend mercy. A life term is the only penalty. In Loestner's room the police found a pint jug of nitroglycerin, a can of dynamite, seven revolvers and a set of brass knucks.

Immigration Statistics. Washington, April 19.—The total immigration to the United States from all countries during March, 1906, according to a statement issued by the immigration bureau was 133,345, or an increase of 70 per cent over March, 1904. For the six months ending March 31, 1906, the immigration from all countries was 461,314, an increase of 25 per cent over a similar period in 1905.

Moody After Guano Combine. Pensacola, Fla., April 19.—A summons has been issued to the officers of the Goulding Fertilizer company, of this city, to answer before the grand jury in Nashville on the 28th, with all contracts, books and papers bearing upon their business and connection with other concerns. It is understood that an investigation of all the companies doing business in North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Tennessee, Virginia and other southern states is about to be undertaken by the government because of an alleged merger or combine to control prices of the product of the different producing companies. It is stated upon good authority that Attorney General Moody is directing the matter personally.

Parks Out for High Court. Montgomery, Ala., April 19.—Chancellor W. L. Parks, of the southeastern chancery division, has announced his candidacy for associate justice of the supreme court of Alabama. Chancellor Parks resides at Troy and is one of the state's best known lawyers. There are two positions of associate justice to be filled and up to the announcement of Chancellor Parks there was but one candidate, Associate Justice J. R. Dowell. Associate Justice Tyson, whose term expires next fall, is a candidate for chief justice against Chief Justice Weakley. Chancellor Parks says he will make a vigorous but dignified campaign and hopes to visit all sections of Alabama.

New Street Railway System. San Francisco, April 19.—A new street railway system for San Francisco that will cover the entire city and operate at least two hundred miles of road, is the proposition embodied in articles of incorporation filed here Tuesday. The new corporation is called the Municipal Street Railways of San Francisco, and is capitalized at \$14,000,000, \$4,500,000 of which has been subscribed. Ten per cent of the latter amount has been paid into a local bank. The incorporators are G. W. Spreckler, James Helan, Rudolph Spreckles and C. S. Wheeler.
