## NEWS OF CITY AND COUNTY CONDENSED

W. L. McDowell of Savannah, traveling representative of the J. P. Williams Company, naval stores, was in the city yesterday, having come to confer with Special Agent A. Paul of the United States land office in the adjustment of some timber trespass matters. The J. P. Williams Company were innocent in the premises, however, but were purchasers of some naval stores products procured from government land, and under these circumstances the government holds them equally responsible. Captain Paul, however, states that he believes the matter will be amicably adjusted.

Joseph J. Tinsley, representing E. R. Brackett Company, commission merchants, New York, has joined his wife and mother in this city, after a tour of South Florida. Mr. Tinsley reports that the recent cold did considerable damage to the oranges of South Florida, but that the groves in the vicinity of Winter Garden, near Lake Apopka, and Clearwater Harbor, on the West Coast, were comparatively uninjured. In fact, the fruit all along the West Coast suffered little, but as a rule in the interior is badly damaged. The lettuce crop in the Sanford section is also damaged, being almost a total loss.

### PRIEST IS NOT GUILTY.

That Was the Verdict of Jury in This Celebrated Murder Case.

"We, the jury, find the defendant not guilty."

That was the verdict rendered by the jury at the special term of the circuit court of Levy county at Bronson Saturday night to try R. D. Priest, who was charged with the murder of the marshal of Williston, on the day of the primary election last year.

It is said by those who were present that the jury was out only about thirty minutes, which is evidence that the verdict must have been on the first ballot.

This was one of the hardest fought legal battles ever known in Levy county, brilliant talent having been engaged on both sides. Among those for the defense were Judge Syd L. Carter and Congressman Frank Clark of this city, and the decision was a great victory for them.

### PUBLIC SCHOOL OPENED.

Spring Term Began With Most Flattering Prospects Monday Morning.

The spring term of the University High School, of which Prof. Tom F. McBeath is principal, began Monday morning with most flattering prospects, a fine attendance reporting for duty.
